JOURNAL NAME:

CASCABEL - Spanish - Origin as small bell or CAMPANILLA, [pro: KASKEBEL], spherical bell, knob like projection.

CASCABLE - English Spelling.





REASON FOR:

Once a fixed extension left over when a muzzle loaded GUN was molten cast. It was the left over molten ore plug from the cast liquid entry point. Left on, as it was found to be a good handle to move or elevate barrel. Then shaped to look like a bell.

ARTILLERY USE:

After 1800AD, it became adjustable. The breech is closed in large calibres by a CASCABEL[E] screw, which is a solid block of forged wrought iron, screwed into the breech coil until it presses against the end of the steel tube. In the smaller calibres, the A bore tube is carried through to form the CASCAPET[E] through to form the CASCABEL[E]. [Ref: Text Book on Fortification Etc" Royal Military College, Sandhurst, By COL G. The name was put forward by the first Editor, LT COL ROB GAW. And accepted because of it's unique and obviously Artillery connection.

ASSN LOGO:

Our Association LOGO, is the 1800AD 9pdr Waterloo Field Gun. Copy is taken from Device, Badge and Motto of the Royal Regiment of Artillery, as approved in 1833, HM King William IV.

LAPEL BADGE:

Copy of the left arm brass gilted gun once worn by Gun Sergents above the chevrons on each arm. Brassards worn by IG's at North Head were embroided with this insignia. Selected by MAJ WARREN BARNARD 1984 Assn Committee.






FIG: 1 Association Members in the Chapel Street Officers Mess:




FIG 3: SPLASH! Pic (C) MAJ Brian JACKSON 1995



DARTYS OP

At a presentation [Holsworthy, 6 Aug 94] to Members of the RAA Assn (NSW) the Director of Artillery, COL JOHN. COX reported on a number of his DARTY observations.

LEVELS - Currently there are only 19 ARA & ARes Artillery Btys to support 21 ARA & ARes Infantry Battalions and Armoured Regt. We are short of fire power.

OPERATIONS - 1995 the RAA Conference will focus on the application of Joint Offensive Support.

AMMUNITION - DARTY is striving to obtain more terminally effective ammo and ammo with greater range capability.

AIR DEFENCE - The RAPIER, surface to air defence system reaches the end of its supportable life around the year 2000 and consideration is being given to replacement equipment and simulator trainers to deal with the type of aircraft beyond 2000.

DIV LOCATING - More responsive systems are needed to process target data to allow rapid engagement of targets.

- Consideration is being given to the acquisition of new systems such as "Unmanned Aerial Vehicles" and "Unattended Ground Sensors".

- 1 Div & Land Comd are examining a new organization which would increase 131 Div Loc Bty structure & responsibilities.





In an interesting article called "Field Artillery The Turn of the Century" by MAJOR C.B.W. STOCK RA - the following developments and research will be of interest to Gunners.

TOWED ARTILLERY

[] A new Position & Pointing System (PPS) will do away with the director and dial sight, significantly reducing the "into action" time & simplifying training. [Position will be by GPS]. For the PPS a BENDIX Aiming and Pointing System (APS), is now being tested [on the FH70].

On the right hand side Trunnion you can see the INERTIAL REFERENCE UNIT, and beside the dial sight mount on the left hand side the LAYERS DISPLAY UNIT that replaces the old

optical dial sight. A solid red light in the centre of the cross indicates the gun is layed.

SP ARTILLERY

- [] A Muzzle Velocity Measuring Device (MVMD) would feed a predicted MV into the ballistic calculation for each round this removes a major component of error, when considering the first round fired.
- [] On-Board Computation (OBC) removes the total reliance on the 2 BCPs it would also increase the number of potential deployment options. The system becomes robust & survivability increases.
- [] Investigations are being conducted on ways of measuring SHELL WEIGHT, CHAMBER TEMPERATURE, RAM DEPTH & BARREL DEFLECTION for OBC use.

AMMUNITION

- [] The U.S. are currently looking at a 105mm HIGH CAPACITY (HICAP) round, using longer fin stabilised shells constructed from composites and containing bomblet type submunitions. These HICAP may give a 105mm shell the lethality of a current 155mm round.
- [] The 105mm Light Gun and ammo provides a rapid deployment option in that it is readily air portable/droppable. The 155mm ammo is not as easily transportable as 105mm ammo in a rapidly moving operation and this places severe demands on support assets.
- [] Ammo Trailers offer the fastest means of resupply in that a gun and its empty trailer can pass through an ammo point, drop the empty trailer, hook up a new load. A ammo dedicated vehicle takes longer to reload.

MINE DETECTOR

Associate Prof CHARLES DON & Mr ANDREW ROGERS, MONASH Dept of Physics, report in a paper "Innovative mine detector a sound idea" Nov 1994 - that they have developed an acoustic [sound echo] based detector that can detect plastic or timber objects & mines. Current system only find metal mines. This system can reveal depth & location.

M712 COPPERHEAD

AUSTRALIAS FIRST

Australian Gunners from 103 Mdm Bty have fired their first Cannon Launched Guided Munitions [CLGM] the M712 COPPERHEAD projectile. This was done on the 8th June 1995 at Infantry Centre, Singleton Range.

THE TARGET DESIGNATOR

The round accuracy comes from a DSTO P3 laser target designator marking the target from a 2 km range. At the recent test, a 3sqm target was destroyed by the such a round.

A VARO LTM91 Copperhead Designation, the normal operational laser target marker for the Copperhead will be issued to selected RAA FO's in late 1995.

These laser designator have another advantage for a FO, as they can be used for aircraft Precision Guided Munitions [PGMs].

FLIGHT OPERATION

The Copperhead can be fired from our M198 155mm howitzer without modification. With a range from 3-16 km. They follow a ballistic trajectory, looking for a specific reflected laser frequency projected onto a target by an FO. Once acquired a fin guidance system provides flight corrections until the HEAT or SHAPED round [designed to defeat armour with a top contact] hits the target.

LIMITS

The Copperhead is a "Smart" weapon. It should not to be confused with "fire & forget" "Brilliant" weapons. Accuracy is it's key.

The SHAPED charge warhead has a devastating accuracy against bunkers, buildings, armour and Naval troop vessels targets. However, it does not carry the same destructive HE effect as a Std HE round, and is too costly for troop targets or preparatory fire.

Two main limiting factor effect this round-weather and its low rate of fire. Weather effects the laser and only one target at a time can be engaged by the FO. In an attacking armoured formation, well trained FOs will be needed. At present it is seen as a low level operations munitions.

DISTRIBUTION


The new Improved Conventional Munitions [ICM] and Copperhead were demonstrated to Senior Army Officers and defence civilians on the 21 June 1995, also at the Singleton Range. The Directorate of Artillery reports that the Australian Government has purchased a number of these artillery precision rounds. Only two Mdm Btys will be issued with the Copperhead. Our 38 Mdm Bty, 2/10 Mdm Regt in Geelong and 103 Mdm Bty in Holsworthy.

The estimated price of a Copperhead is [Aust] \$41,000 per round.

GERMAN RAIL GUN

Recently, while going through my fathers army box, that has been in the family since my father first joined the British Army in the late 1890s, where he saw action in the BOER WAR, WW1 and WW2 (Garrison P.O.W.), reaching the rank of Sergeant.

I found a set of "Comfort War Cards" that could be sent home to loved one's [each

depicted an important war event]. During the 1914-18 war, my parents lived in Australia and while on duty in France, my father sent a set of the following cards back home, one was about a GERMAN RAIL GUN captured by the Australians. This very gun eventually found its way back to Australia, and stood on rails outside the CANBERRA RAILWAY STATION. I first saw the Gun when I was at Duntroon in 1941 and was amazed at it's size, ...it was huge!


During WW2 it disappeared, and no one seemed to know what had happened to the gun? It wasn't until many years after the war, I was talking to a RAEME LtCol, and mentioned the gun.

As it turns out, the LtCol revealed the story, as he claimed to have been involved in its disappearance. He reported the gun was taken from CANBERRA to BANDIANA Military Depot, there it was dismantled to study the construction of the undercarriage, as the Defence Department had ideas of manufacturing their own "Rail Gun". As to the new guns size and where it was going to be use, he had no idea. In the end nothing came out of the research. When I asked what happened to all the bits and pieces, it seems that they lay around BANDIANA for years, finally going to either the tip or a foundry.... What a pity.

In the end the gun barrel, I understand, went back to CANBERRA and is with the WAR MEMORIAL MUSEUM, but I am not exactly sure.



LONG TOMS IN ACTION WEWAK 1945

In New Guinea in 1945 the GOC & CRA of 6th Division had been requesting the allocation of two "Long Toms" since Sept 1944 and by the beginning of April 1945, both were getting quite terse on the subject of their communications to HQ 1st Aust Army.

GUNS AND NO STORES

On the 6th April 1945 the two guns arrived at AITAPE and were allocated to 2/3 Fd Regt, along with 1200 rounds of ammunition, one dial sight, no gun drill or handbooks and no stores.

The LAD fitted 25pdr dial sights, field clinometers and manufactured rammers, firing lanyards and other essentials.

THE "X" BTY

The detachments manning the 155mm guns [made up from gunners from 6 Bty], were called "X" Bty and now 2/3 Fd Regt's weaponry consisted of 25 pdrs, 4.2 inch mortars and two 155mm.

[NOTE: The dust cover in this Journal edition].

On 28th April 1945 the guns were loaded onto barges and moved to NAGUIB, in great secrecy. They engaged their first targets on the 1st May 1945 at CAPE WOM, MUSCHU BAY and WEWAK with great effect.

THE BLAST EFFECT

The gun positions were often very close to the main road, consequently when they came into action and fired all road traffic was stopped. These hold ups did not please everybody including an engineers truck which disobeyed the sentry, kept driving and took the full blast of No 2 gun, thereby shattering the windscreen and flattening all the personnel standing in the back of the truck.

THE HANDOVER

"X" Battery was in continuous action until the 6th June 1945, when it handed over the guns to 4 Bty, 2/2 Fd Regt, having fired 816 rounds. The 2/1 Fd Regt also had these guns for a period in the WEWAK area.




FIG 2: Night firing by "X" Bty of 2/3 Fd Regt, 6 Aust Div and their 155mm "Long Toms" in action against WEWAK 1945.

AUSTRALIAN GUNNERS AT A-BOMB TESTS EMU & MARALINGA

THE

LEN BEADELL SURVEY STORY

I have just finished reading a series of books written by MR LEN BEADELL, OAM BEM, which involved his post war experiences in the surveying and road construction of a number of road ways in the outback of Australia over some 25 years.

To many of the older readers he may be known as the man responsible for the famous "Gun Barrel Highway" across central Australia.

TO FIND A ROCKET RANGE

LEN BEADELL was born in 1923 on a farm in West Pennant Hills, NSW and after service in the Army in New Guinea with the Army Survey Corps, (perhaps he was not aware that Artillery sometimes used surveyors) was invited to defer his discharge while the British Government set up a "small" rocket testing range some-where in the outback of South Australia. Reading his books provides some very absorbing back ground to the area as it was just on 50 years ago. I am sure that there may be readers of this Journal who also spent time on this project as the new township that developed from a small farm watering hole was soon to be known all around the world as the WOOMERA rocket range. The name was taken from the aboriginal name for a throwing stick that assisted the projecting of a spear from the throwers arm, thus gaining a better advantage. A suitable meaning for the future home of rocket launching.

MARALINGA SITE

Later on LEN was asked to locate and survey another sight for the setting up of another town, further west in the desert from WOOMERA, and this became known as MARALINGA.

LEN's books are very interesting to read, as he builds a picture of a young man, then who

would never be able to settle down in the "big smoke" as described a number of times on his obligatory visits to HQ in Melbourne and to KESWICK BARRACKS Adelaide. He appears as he was made to live in the outback.

Interesting facts are revealed through out, while he describes how he went about shooting star or sun observations while monitoring standard time signals and then adjusting to data from the star almanacs, to pinpoint his position on the ground to an accurate location.

It is interesting to also note that he started from a previously surveyed "trig" point that had been laid in before the turn of the century by one of the early pioneer surveyors and when he stepped along to following points the accuracy with which the old "trigs" were placed showed how well the older instruments worked.

ATOMIC TEST

On the 15 Oct 1953 the British Government exploded an atomic device in Australia. the site was called EMU and was situated around 132 deg 20 min Long, and 28 deg 32 min S Lat, just south of LAKE MERAMANGYE in South Australia. LEN BEADLE was the surveyor responsible for the triangulation and layout of all equipment, including the bomb that had to be accurately placed above the detonation point, and for all the tracks and monitoring points that were being used by all the staff there at the time.

As the boffins were trying to find out the effects of blast, heat, fallout and any other effects associated with a nuclear detonation, there were a number of experiments conducted to see the results. One of the tests involved the placement of a working 20 Ton Centurion tank complete with a dummy driver near the centre of blast, and another one required the firing of a number of rocket projectiles through the atomic cloud for observation of effects of the nuclear cloud on conventional weaponry.

THE RAA AT MARALINGA

There is a photo in LEN's book called "Blast The Bush", [82], which shows the rocket launcher being adjusted through a gun sight on the side of the carriage.

Are there any readers who can identify this equipment that was used or perhaps offer some technical details of the ordnance used. I have searched all my available sources and can find no details of such a weapon in the post war Australian Artillery literature.

Is there a reader who served at WOOMERA at this time? Can any one identify the profile view of the person looking in the dial sight? If there is I would love to see some details of the Regiment involved in this part of the WOOMERA story. I believe our last postings of RAA personnel was in June 1974. Who were they and where are they now?



Supply. Later he was a Central Australian tour operator guide. In 1989 he was awarded the Order of Australia for public services and services to literature. He wrote 6 books. He was buried at GAWLER, SA on May 17.



A NOTE ON

"AN" PREFIXED

RADIOS

Members may be interested in a fuller explanation of the AN/PRC nomenclature which forms part of the US military system of signals equipment identification.

The simplest way to explain what is a fairly complex system is by using an example - lets look at the unit with the "nomenclature" "AN/PRC-25".

This is made up of five parts: "AN", "P", "R", "C", and "25".

AN:

The nomenclature of any complete end item is prefixed by the letters "AN". This means two

Firstly, it is the system indicator, meaning that the nomenclature was derived from the meaning Joint Services system (US Army Navy and Air Force, Marines) and the end item nomenclature is common to all these services. The actual equipment is not necessarily used by all services

Secondly, it means that the nomenclature stands for a complete end item, which in turn may be made up of individual items.

P:

This stands for the installation type or "where is it used?". In the case of "P" this means "portable"or "pack", depending on whether it is transportable by man or animal. Other letters in this series include;

- "A" for aircraft installation,
- "K" for installation in amphibious craft,
 "G" for general ground use.

· There are 14 possible letters in this series.

R:

This is the type of equipment, or the "what is it". The letter "R" stands for radio. There are 18 possible letters in this series, some examples being;

- "B" for pigeon,
- "C" for carrier (wire equipment such as interphones) and,
- "p" for radar.

C:

The last letter stands for the function of the equipment, i.e. what the equipment does. The letter "C" stands for communications, both receiving and transmitting. There are 17 possible designations in this series, such as;

- "A" for auxiliary assemblies (ie not complete operating sets in their own right),
- "Q" for special types,
 "D" for direction finding,
- "J" for countermeasure, and
- "R" for equipment which receives, but does not transmit.

25:

This is the model number of the specific type within the series designated by the preceding letters.

Hence, AN/PRC-25 stands for a US Military manpack radio which both sends and receives, with the model designation 25.

COMPONENTS:

As mentioned earlier, the "AN" designates a complete end unit, which may be made up from a series of interchangeable components. The AN/PRC-25, for example, is a small set made up of only three components, as follows;

- A receiver-transmitter, designated the RT-505/PRC-25
- An antenna, EITHER an AT-892/PRC-25 3-foot semi rigid tape aerial, OR an AT-271A/PRC 10-foot long multisection whip aerial.
- A battery, EITHER a BA-38/U carbon dry cell, OR a BA-4386/U magnesium cell battery.

Other, larger sets are made up of more components. The AN/VRC-49, for example, is based upon two RT-524 receiver-transmitter, mounted on two MT-1029/VRC mounting trays, with the radio set controller C-2299/VRC, and two aerials, either the AT-912/VRC or AS-1729/VRC. The AN/VRC-49 installation is commonly mounted in Australian M113A1 APC/LRV vehicles at Troop headquarters level and above.

AUSTRALIAN USAGE:

The $\Delta N/PRC-25$ was first introduced into Australian service around the beginning of our involvement in the Vietnam War, and was an improvement on earlier manportable sets, such as the AN/PRC-7, 8, 9, and 10 series of radios.

The "Prick-25", as it was often called, was also very useful from a logistics point of view, since the main receiver-transmitter, formed the basis of other radio applications, such as the AN/GRC-125.

The AN/GRC-125 vehicle set was basically a "Prick-25" mounted with an amplifier power supply on a base which was mounted in a vehicle. It was supplied with the backpack

harness and radio batteries as a whole unit to make it more versatile, these extra components being stowed in the vehicle when not in use. The basic component, the RT-505/PRC-25, could be quickly demounted from the vehicle base and combined with the backpack components for use as a manpack set. Anyone travelling in an Australian M113A1 APC/LRV since the mid-1960s would remember the AN/GRC-125 as being one of the two radios mounted on the shelf behind the driver. The other radio carried within a Troop was (still is, in most cases!) the AN/VRC-47, with the whole installation interconnected by the AN/VIC-1 inter-communication harness.

Although, many of these radios were withdrawn from service with US Forces from the late 1960s, they have remained in use with Australian Forces to the present day. For example, the "Prick-25" was replaced in US service by the "Prick-77" around 1969, whereas Australia purchased the "Prick-77" to supplement existing radio stocks.

Only now are we seeing the introduction of the sophisticated RAVEN series of radios, which are currently being introduced into the ARA. Even so, the earlier equipment is destined to continue in service for some time yet. Not bad for a radio that first entered service in the 1960s!



WHAT DOES THE

ABBREVIATION "SOS"

In CASCABEL #44, April 95, p17-21, we ran an article about problems associated with 2/3 Aust Fd Regt Short 25pdr. In the "Abbreviations" [p21] we could not find a

task or reference for "SOS". COL ALAN G. C. MASON ED, [a association member], kindly responded to our enquiry and in correspondence to the Editor COL MASON listed the following three references under his title; "What does the abbreviation "SOS" mean?".

(i) EXTRACT: AT vol III Fd Gunnery PAM 3 1947, Sec 38 - Allotment of Target Numbers, para 282.

Records of certain types of targets are required for reference more frequently and more rapidly that those of the great bulk of recorded targets e.g. DF and DF(SOS) tasks (DF = Defensive Fire).

In many cases DF(SOS) tasks are 100/200 metres from our infantry - in front, to the side or behind.

(ii) EXTRACT: 6 Aust Division Standing Orders - Book 1, Chapter 2, Section 8, "SOS FIRE".

Part 1; [b]. Unless order to the contrary are issued SOS fire will be called down by the company commander.

[e]. Calls for SOS fire will be made by -

(i) Pyrotechnics(ii) Telephone. (To be used only in country pyrotechnics cannot be observed).

Part 2; The rates of fire of MMG, Mortar & Artillery for SOS fire are set out below:

[c]. Artillery - 3 minutes intensity
2 minutes normal.

Part 3; The above will be repeated on the firing by the company commander of the SOS signal.

(iii) NOTES: From memory of Regimental Standing Orders, 2/12 Aust Fd Regt, 9 Aust Div.

1. When deployed in support of infantry;

[a]. The guns will be loaded and laid on the DF(SOS) at all times not engaged on other targets.

[b]. A piquet per gun will be available to fire it on observing the pyrotechnic signal.

NOTE: Any one gun may have only one DF(SOS) task.

ANECDOTE

TOBRUK 1945. Due to a long pause after the first round in answering a call for fire, an investigation found that the gun crew in taking post from their slit trenches had tripped over the desert brush in their bare feet. The result a Standing Order that when guns were in action gun crews would sleep with their boots on. Valid for the rest of the war.

CHEQUERED HISTORY FOR THE 2ND DIVISION 1915 TO 1995

By

WO1 BOB GEORGE RSM, HQ 2 DIV

The 2nd Division was formed in EGYPT on the 26th of July, 1915, and the date is celebrated as our Foundation Day.

The Division was deployed to the GALLIPOLI Peninsula on September 6th, 1915. In April 1916, it became the first Australian force to enter the lines on the Western Front where it saw action in many famous battles including MESSINES, THE SOMME, POZIERES, BULLECOURT and YPRES. It was during these battles that 13 soldiers of the Division were decorated with the VC. The Division remained in FRANCE until the Armistice.

Between the World Wars the Division remained a MILITIA FORMATION as part of the 1st Army, AMF.

During the early years of WWII, the Division was responsible for the defence of SYDNEY. The 8th & 14th Brigades subsequently saw action in NEW GUINEA and in the South West Pacific campaigns from 1942 to 1945, with Battle Honours including KOKODA, MADANG, BUNA, GONA and the Liberation of Australian New Guinea.

During the years following WWII the Division continued to serve as a major RESERVE FORMATION in NSW with its 2 brigades - the 5th & 8th Brigade.

In April 1993, following the disbandment of HQ 3RD DIVISION, the VICTORIAN based 4th Brigade was placed under command 2nd Division, making it a 3 Brigade Division.

Then on the 1st of September, 1994, the 9th Brigade from SOUTH AUSTRALIA and TASMANIA and the 13th Brigade from WESTERN AUSTRALIA joined to make it a 5 Brigade Division.

The 2nd Division is a dynamic organization. It has a total strength of 10,300 with 600 Regulars.

The Division geographical spread is enormous. It is probably the biggest Division in the world in terms of area occupied - from the East Coast to the West Coast and everywhere in between.

It contains a total of 7 Formation Level HQs as follows - Division, 5 Brigades and a Divisional Artillery. And comprises 62 units, occupying about 150 depots.



"MATES AND MEMORIES"
Recollections of the 2/10th Field Regiment RAA

By DR ROBERT GOODWIN

This press is noted for its previous military titles. The author is not to be confused with DR RUPERT D. GOODMAN who publishes with the same press. The author served with the 2/10 Fd Regt as a Lieutenant in Malaya, endured captivity under the Japanese, and post war became a doctor.

The book is a welcome addition to previous WW2 artillery unit histories. It is divided into three parts, the first dealing with formation until the conclusion of the battle for Singapore. The second as prisoners on Singapore and the third as prisoners throughout Asia.

The book is just over 200 pages long. It is evident that the authors interest in medical matters explains why part 2 and 3 take up two thirds of the book. I am not in the position to vouch for the accuracy of those parts but I can comment on the first part. A trap for the casual reader of the book is that an important Nominal Roll is at the end of part 1, whereas arguably it should be at the end with the Honour Roll. Note that officers are listed first in the Nominal Roll. The book is blessed with an index although not all photos are indexed. In following up references to one of the CO's LT COL A.M. WALSH the index omits a reference to him on page 23. Curiously, the absence of the newly appointed LT COL WALSH is not fully explained, nor when he returned to the Regiment. It is also not explained why he temporarily left the Regiment during the Malayan battles.

Significantly the book lacks a bibliography. The section on war preparation an battles are particularly unsatisfactory. Some of the battles are hard to follow as the places mentioned are not on the maps. The author states in his two page section on the NITHSDALE ESTATE BATTLE that it was "one of the most successful, but least publicised, battles of the Malayan campaign. Unfortunately, the author adds little to our knowledge of this battle. Much could have been written about the 2/10th in action. Although the book mentions the re-equipment

of the Regiment with the 25pdr one needs to read "Gunners In The Jungle", the history of the 2/15th Fd Regt to learn that the guns of the 2/10th were ever calibrated. The unit history of the 2/18th Battalion has an extensive section on this battle and a reference to the 2/10 Fd Regt. The history of the 2/15th Fd Regt gives an excellent feel for what it was like to fight in these conditions and the subsequent battle for Singapore.

The account of the battle for Singapore lacks reference to readily available histories, such as that for the 2/30th Battalion, "Galleghan's Greyhounds" first published in 1979. In that history there are numerous references to its supporting artillery, the 2/10th. I feel that by using existing published histories and use of recollections of veterans of the 2/10th a more complete account could have been told. On page 34 of "Mates and Memories", reference is made to BLACK JACK GALLAGHAN and a confrontation with him. This should read GALLEGHAN. It is only by reading the history of the 2/30th Battalion that the reason for the confrontation becomes clear. It would have been of historical interest to learn more details of this confrontation as it does appear to be mentioned in the biography "Black Jack" by STAN ARNEIL.


