
FUNCTION: The change over in Command occurred on SUNDAY, 10th DEC 1995 at a function for "THE FEAST OF SAINT BARBARA - Patron Saint of Gunners". 2/10 Medium Regiment was on Parade at their RHQ & HQ Bty RAA Depot, 8 Chapel Street East St Kilda. Col JOHN KIRKWOOD Commander Divisional Artillery, [CDA 2 Div], witnessed the "Change in Command" to LtCol CARL WOOD.

JOURNAL NAME:

<u>CASCABEL</u> - Spanish - Origin as small bell or <u>CAMPANILLA</u>, [pro: KASKEBEL], spherical bell,

knob like projection. <u>CASCABLE</u> - English Spelling.





REASON FOR:

Once a fixed extension left over when a muzzle loaded GUN was molten cast. It was the left over molten ore plug from the cast liquid entry point. Left on, as it was found to be a good handle to move or elevate barrel. Then shaped to look like a bell.

ARTILLERY USE:

After 1800AD, it became adjustable. The breech is closed in large calibres by a CASCABEL[E] screw, which is a solid block of forged wrought iron, screwed into the breech coil until it presses against the end of the steel tube. In the smaller calibres, the A bore tube is carried through to form the CASCABEL[E]. [Ref: Text Book on Fortification Etc" Royal Military College, Sandhurst, By COL G. The name was put forward by the first Editor, LT COL ROB GAW. And accepted because of it's unique and obviously Artillery connection.

ASSN LOGO:

Our Association LOGO, is the 1800AD 9pdr Waterloo Field Gun. Copy is taken from Device, Badge and Motto of the Royal Regiment of Artillery, as approved in 1833, HM King William IV.

LAPEL BADGE:

Copy of the left arm brass gilted gun once worn by Gun Sergents above the chevrons on each arm. Brassards worn by IG's at North Head were embroided with this insignia. Selected by MAJ WARREN BARNARD 1984 Assn Committee.





NEW PUCKAPUNYAL ARTILLERY CENTRE

On the 1 December 1995, Parliament gave approval for the \$35 million development of the new ARTILLERY CENTRE at Puckapunyal. Work on the new Artillery Centre should start in APRIL 1996 and be finished by NOVEMBER 1997. [REF: Herald Sun, 2 Dec 95, p4].

READY RESERVE FACES AXE

The Ready Reserve, faces the axe under a Coalition government. Opposition leader JOHN HOWARD launched his defence policy at the Australian Defence Association in Melbourne on 6th OCT 95. He tells us;

"The Coalition has serious concerns about the Ready Reserve scheme as it does not address gaps in defence capabilities, it lacks readiness and its cost is high relative to its capacity."

ARMY MANPOWER STRENGTH - DOWN

New manpower figures released to SENATOR J. NEWMAN show that Not one of the Army's 12 combat units was at full peacetime strength:

- One combat unit was down	68.0%
- Four combat units were down	20.0%
- ADF unit Port Hedland down	19.5%
- ADF unit Darwin was down	22.0%
- ADF unit Cairns was down	13.5%
- GRes Commando unit in	
support of SAS was down	26.0%.
- SAS or first contact unit	
was 53 short of its 572	9.3%

The figures show that for 1993/94 the ADF interviewed 18,000 but only 3000 were accepted. The figures show Logistic & Admin units having full manpower quota.

To counter the above levels the Government has changed pay, conditions and career structure. The revamp summary is as follows;

- Pay 11.7% rise.
- Pay scale cut from 9 to 7 categories.
- Field allowance up 200%.
- Low interest loans up to \$80,000.Scope to live outside base.
- Super access.
- Child care & spouse assistance.
- Greater travel entitlement.
- Job sharing / home based work
 Bonus & incentive pay.
- Less family moves.

COMPULSORY RETIREMENT CHANGES APPROVED

As reported in CASCABEL #45, pl4 - the compulsory retirement age for general service officers is now approved. It has been raised to 55 years for all ranks. The past policy required one to retire if your ranks was;





FORT GUN SITES HOBSON BAY

6th HEAVY BRIGADE 1939

Most important feature of the day [SAT 28th OCT 1995], the weather, looked like being a very nice day, which it was. I was looking forward to this trip, for me it was a look back down memory lane.

After the known members of the tour had arrived, the numbers could have been better. Ten marks to SSgt REG MORRELL and his helpers, for the effort they put into these excursions.

First we had a very informative talk, in the lecture room at Oakleigh Barracks, conducted by JIM NEWLANDS - B.Agr.Sc(Melb) B.Ed(Monash) Grad.Dip.App.Sc. (Soc Stats) (Swinburne), who also supplied us with maps and paper-work to put us all in the picture, of the Forts that surrounded the top end of PORT PHILLIP BAY in the early days of MELBOURNE and WILLIAMSTOWN.

Next it was embus and to confuse the enemy, who may be watching, the coach had the word the "Royal Australian Airforce", on the outside. Nothing was being left to chance.

EARLY FORTIFICATIONS

Number one stop was POINT ORMOND, one of the early fortifications and later a Quarantine Station. We all made it to the top of the hill, binoculars were the order of the day, and added attraction was a young couple, laying down with a blanket over them. A large empty wine bottle alongside and both were sound asleep, part of his attire was down round his feet, which were sticking out from under the blanket. Whether this was supposed

to be our welcoming committee, who had got carried away, I don't know and I didn't dare ask.

As we continued our tour JIM NEWLANDS, pointed out positions of the old Forts that had extended from Pt ORMOND to SANDRIDGE (Port Melb) on that side of the bay.

Over Westgate Bridge, owing to the excellent weather everything was at its best, good visibility, 360 degrees, an artillery observers dream. Next stop was the Spotswood Science Works, I must mention that from the moment I saw JIM NEWLANDS, he had a small set of steps with him which had me rather intrigued, I was soon to find out what they were for. The object of the visit to the Science Works was to have a look at an Airraid shelter that was used in the 1939-45 war.

WWII AIR-RAID SHELTER

It was one of the most unusual air-raid shelters I have ever seen, that is after they got the wooden door open and from all accounts it hadn't been open for a long time. The lock refused to budge, going through my mind was "Open O Sesame", those famous words may have helped, because shortly after this it decided to open... Oh well.


Now the set of steps (the entrance to the shelter was half way up a brick wall, which now that they had finally got the door open) were needed to get into it. The spiders resented our intrusion, cobwebs were everywhere. For the older members of the group (including me) muscles came into play that hadn't been used for years. 8-10 people, and it was full, standing up, perhaps that was the idea of having the entrance half way up the wall, in case of an air-raid only the fit and able made that climb, were going to be the only survivors.

WILLIAMSTOWN

Next stop WILLIAMSTOWN (not many people get a town named after them ... joke) had a look at some muzzle loaders on the fore-shore, these proved to be of great interest to everyone. [9-inch RML 1867, 12 Tons s/n 1679 and 1683 by ARMSTRONG]. Then lunch at the historic Yacht Club Hotel, not exactly the Hilton, but the food was good and cheap.

FORT GELLIBRAND

After lunch, FORT GELLIBRAND, this was like returning home to me, I had enlisted in the ROYAL AUSTRALIAN GARRISON ARTILLERY, RAA (M) 1936-37;

While all the others were having a look at the old fortifications, (which I had seen before) I went over to the old Drill Hall and just stood inside on my own. It hadn't changed, the wooden red gum floor was still

as shiny as ever, time had stood still. The last time I was in that drill hall was in 1941, to hand in my uniform, after the Defence Department, whom I was with, were most adamant they were not going to release me under any circumstance.

6TH HEAVY BRIGADE

The 6th Heavy Brigade, what did it do I was asked, well apart from our artillery duties and schools, plus our annual shoot down at FORT QUEENSCLIFF which extended over Easter holiday period, we were very good at Ceremonial Parades, both the GARRISON ARTILLERY and the FORTRESS ENGINEERS had spectacular uniforms. I should mention that for the 6th Heavy Brigade [pre war], you had to be recommended by at least 2 serving members, also there was a 3 month period when you attended parades in MUFTI, this was to see if you liked the Army and if the Army see if you liked the Army and if the Army liked you. Most drill nights there was always someone outside the door wanting to join up.

6TH HB UNIFORM

The uniform.... Artillery, was dark navy blue, high collar, red stripe down the side of pants, yellow piping on sleeves and epaulets, brass buttons, with brass bomb flashes on collar. The cap for night wear, used a big brass cannon on front. And for day wear, a white helmet, brass cannon was used. With ceremonials we used a leather, belt.

DUNTROON R.M.C.

The basic uniform is the same as they still wear at DUNTROON R.M.C. today. Seeing that MAJGEN SIR WILLIAM THROSBY BRIDGES, KCB CMG-(first Commandant of the college), who was also an Artillery man, obviously had something to do with what type of uniform the Cadets were going to wear.

FORTRESS ENGINEERS UNIFORMS

Fortress Engineers.... uniforms were identical to the artillery, except where we had red on our uniforms they had a pale blue and for parades they wore white gloves.

OLD DIGGERS AND PRACTICE

Seeing the Regiment had be presented with the "Keys of the City of Williamstown", we used the street to practice our ceremonial marches, mainly on a Friday night, when they had 9:00pm closing. People used to look forward to hearing the band and us marching. There was only one drawback, the hotel had 6:00pm closing in those days, so by the time we started our parade the "Old Soldiers of the 1914-18 war" were nicely primed to be in the contract of the started our parade to fall in and march it again. They used to fall in and march around behind us. This didn't go over too well with the O.C. of the parade, so he hit on a brilliant idea. Next time it happened he would march the parade up a side street and called a halt in front of the Salvation Army Hall in WILLIAMSTOWN, the O.C. then went inside and came out with some of the S/A personnel they collected all the "Old Soldiers" for a nice cup of tea. I think our friends got the message, although they used to wave and shout "Good on yer Digger" they didn't join in again. On special occasions we would assemble in

William Street, Melbourne and march straight

down through the City, this was done night or day.

Then we had our annual pilgrimage to the Shrine. I remember quite well the last one we did before the 1939-45 war, it was early in the year of 1939 and a womens protest group decided to organize a rally against anything to do with the armed services. We held our parade (I still have a photo of it) but after we had marched through the Shrine with reversed arms they had to close the doors. I have often wondered what happened to all those people later in the year when war was declared and we were fighting for our very existence!

Oh what memories FORT GELLIBRAND and the 6th Heavy Brigade hold for me. How many from the Regiment are still around, perhaps if they are not members of the RAA Assn, they would like to join, they would be most welcome.

WO2 CRAIG COOK, Museum Secretary, said to me he would like to know more about the 6th Heavy Brigade, I hope what I have written may give him a little insight of what we were all about.

AN ENJOYABLE DAY



ARTILLERY COLOUR PATCHES OF THE LATE MajGen W.A. COXEN

I came across a quaint card apparently produced by MAJOR GENERAL W.A. COXEN between the wars. It comprised a replica of the very distinctive AUSTRALIAN SIEGE BRIGADE AIF colour patch as the centre piece with four fold over sections with small apertures cut out.

Folding over each of these sections aligned the cut out piece with part of the red portion of the AUSTRALIAN SIEGE BRIGADE AIF and contributed to making up the full colour patch of another Artillery element printed on the reverse side of each of the fold over sections. The result was the card could show the colour patch of all the elements of Australian Artillery then in service with the exception of the divisional units (5 infantry and 2 cavalry divisions).

The colour patches depicted are shown below. On the reverse of the card as best I can decipher is;

"It is only a small piece of cloth
Of Artillery Blue and Red
But it brings to mind the days of war
And memories of our glorious dead."

W.A. COXEN.

MAJOR GENERAL W.A. COXEN, CB CMG DSO (1870-1949) was Brigadier General Royal Artillery (BGRA) 1st Australian Corps in france during the breaching of the HINDENBURG Line in 1918, "Der Schwarze Tag" of the German Army in world War 1.

COMMANDED THE GREATEST AGGREGATION OF ARTILLERY

It has been claimed that in the Battle of 8 August he commanded the greatest aggregation of artillery in the history of warfare. It is

certain that he commanded more guns in action than any other Australian before or since.

His distinguished military career began with the QUEENSLAND MILITIA GARRISON ARTILLERY in 1893, then to the QUEENSLAND PERMANENT ARTILLERY, to command the 36th HEAVY ARTILLERY GROUP (the AUSTRALIAN SIEGE BRIGADE AIF) in 1916 and successively as Commander Royal Artillery (CRA) and BGRA.

After the war he went on to the Military Board as Chief of Ordnance, Quartermaster General, Adjutant General and finally Chief of the General Staff from which he retired in 1931, a victim of the Depression. Most of his career was in the service of the guns.

He was appointed Honorary Colonel of the Regiment in 1931 and is shown in that appointment in the June 1940 Army List.

THE BOSS GUNNER

To quote WARREN PERRY;


"It was said of him that if he had not been a captain in arms he would have been a captain of industry. Good temper and a vivid sense of humour characterises this man of action. At the front he was known as "the boss gunner". Gifted with keen insight, and an outsize memory, he never forgets a face or a fact. Efficiency is his watchword."

During a holiday in England in October (1995), I had the occasion to visit the "Home Of Artillery", the WOOLWICH ARSENAL in London, quite a lot has happened there over the last couple of years, as I was to find out. Armed with a letter of introduction from our President MAJ M. TAGGART and \$800 of our Associations money to buy stock from the Corps Shop, I fronted up at the main gate at 10:00hrs on Tuesday 17 October 1995 to be met by armed Gunners (still worries with IRA bomb threats) who told me to park my car, and report to the

guard room, where a Bombardier after a couple of phone calls was put in touch with the Secretary of the R.A. Association, a LT COL "Paddy" STEELE. I was then given an escort to the R.A. Association office, and was warmly greeted by LT COL STEELE who made me feel at home with a cup of tea. A former RSM, PADDY STEEL is one of those rare characters you come across from time to time. I was then taken down to the Corps Shop where I had no trouble spending the Associations and some of my own money, after which it was back upstairs, where PADDY introduced me to the "Boss" - COL MIKE DARMODY, who told me that the R.A. INSTITUTION has had a couple of moves over the last few years, from CONNAUGHT HOUSE, to the OLD MILITARY ACADEMY and finally now into the WOOLWICH BARRACKS proper and so, finally comes under the Army umbrella. WOOLWICH is no longer a training establishment, all recruitment and training are now done with the Guards Regiments at PIRBRIGHT, with Gunnery training done at LARKHILL, before posting to R.A. Regiments.

Property developers wanted to turn WOOLWICH into a shopping complex, but with the return of one of the two Arty Regt's from GERMANY, redevelopment is no longer to take place.

The Master Gunner, GEN SIR MARTIN FARNDALE, KCB is currently trying to raise 20 Million Pounds for restoration works. The Rotunda Museum now has on display, Rapier, S.P. Guns an a Railway gun.

So on a final note, the Royal Artillery will stay at its original home "WOOLWICH".



FROM GUNNERY TO SURVEYOR NOW HE IS 103

Victorias second oldest soldier turned 103 in November 95. Born in NEWPORT, COUNTY TIPPERARY, on November 26, 1892, Bombardier JACK CULLEN came to Melbourne aged 17 [1909] with his Australian born mother. In 1916 he joined the Australian Volunteer Army in FIELD ARTILLERY. Bombardier CULLENS role in WWI was decided by a chance encounter at the first morning milling in MARIBYRNONG CAMP.

"A group to one side said to me, ""What are you doing over in that crowd?"" Stay here with us, and that's how I got into the Artillery. The rest went to infantry".

In france, Bombardier CULLEN worked on trench mortars and slept in catacombs around PASSCHENDALE.

"Little bunch of 8 marched out to the line and spent 10 days in a dugout under the railway embankment at

WESTHOEK RIDGE. It was always raining, the barrel of my gun was always full of mud, we couldn't shoot"

Another time, a blistered heel from tight boots sent him back to reserve line and saved his life.

"The whole team of 8 with my replacement, were killed by one shell. I don't know if it was the Almighty looking after me. I felt terrible about that little chap who took my place, but of course it wasn't my fault, I didn't ask to be sent back."

Bombardier CULLEN recalled an wonderful Australian event on the eve of armistice;

"A General saw us [gunners] unruly and ordered us to polish our harnesses. A thousand of us shouted him off parade.

We lost 63,000 Australians altogether, so any of us who got out of it alive was jolly lucky". Bombardier CULLEN survived the slaughter of WWI in France from 1917 to 1918.

JOINS SURVEY CORPS

Back home in 1920 he then rejoined the Army and went to Survey Corps. During WWII he served as a survey instructor with 3 Fd Survey Company. His daughter BETTY BENGOUGH, remembers how at KYNETON [Victoria] her dad used to bring his topographers home for supper and they would sing around the piano. "Back in the 1920" Bombardier CULLEN recalled, "a corporal and I spent 18 months to walk over, measure and draw a 120 mile area of TALLAROOK with every contour, road and stream recorded."

The same map would take a fortnight today with aerial photography and computer reproduction.

According to his pupil, COLONEL DON McDONALD, who finished up Colonel Director of Survey, JACK CULLEN had a great eye for country. For his 90th birthday, the entire Army Survey Regiment from all over Australia travelled to BENDIGO in his honour.



JUNGLE EMPLOYED

ARTILLERY

FIXED OR MOBILE

By

My days as a CP Sgt and a FO Ack [Qld] are long over, but my interest in jungle operations [looking mostly at WWII PAPUA NEW GUINEA (PNG) operations) still stimulate me as the difficulty that such tasks, place on our gunners & FOs can only be regarded as the supreme field test based on the human difficulty. Just ask any WWII Middle East gunner what he thought about their PNG operations! With this in mind I constantly compare notes from "Jungle Operations" articles and in this summary, I have focused on two short articles, one from ENGLAND by Maj J.C. HOWARD-VYSE, RA [R2] and the other from AUSTRALIA by Maj K.R. HALL, RAA [R2].

HALLS impressive paper backgrounds Australian Artillery operations in VIETNAM in the 1970s, while HOWARD-VYSE looked at the same problem using 1966 BURMA, MALAYA and KENYA operations for his study into future jungle operations. The two papers are not research or definitive policy papers, there is better literature to cover the "Do & Don'ts".

Was Vietnam a jungle war, to most of us it was, but this point is debatable. Therefore, knowing full well that there is no one correct view, CASCABEL gunners may find this simple overview, of some interest.

FIXED AND MOBILE OPERATIONS

HALLS articles is very different to HOWARD-"YYSE vision. HALL tells his story from ground seen & experience". His jungle war is "fixed on the ground", his guns dominate an area and he needs to have a defence policy. [Air cover is vital].

HOWARD-VYSE view is based on a "Mobile Jungle War" [similar to the New Guinea Campaigns]. His war system looks correct, and I believe reflects our current ADF operations policy.

Also HOWARD-VYSE has never been in the jungle with a modern system, unlike HALL. To his credit HOWARD-VYSE recognises this problem and he searches for common solutions.

So which jungle system would you use?. The

mobile system feels and sounds better, the odd thing is, HALLS fixed "Fire Support Base" [F.S.B.] policy is more effective. The "Air
Mobile" factors give it speed and logistics advantages. Although some will argue the finer points. The following short list gives you some idea how a fixed or mobile jungle system differ:




FIG: 1. Diagrammatic layout of section F.S.B. (Outer perimeter wire not shown).

In HALLS conclusion he states;

"The basic differences which exist in fire support procedures in Vietnam are due entirely to local conditions and conditions requirements. These conditions have led to additional safety factors and to some change in adjustment techniques. But despite these small variations, operations in SOUTH VIETNAM have confirmed our existing doctrine and techniques. However, certain domestic problems and weaknesses in the organisation and establishment of the Field Regiment have been emphasised. For example, there are insufficient FOs to match the establishment of the infantry battalion and increments had to be provided to man such necessary cells as the Arty AirStrike Warning Control Centre [AASWCC] and Arty Tec. These should not remain "ad hoc" organisations but should be catered for within the regiment, and the skills and techniques which evolved in VIETNAM should be kept alive."

The RA & the RAA views are most interesting, principally for the different perspectives relative to theatre of operation. And that's the point: - have we practice it or is distance stopping us looking at two types.

A NEED TO UPDATE

The ADF operations [North Force] at present are not jungle operations. However, PNG & INDONESIA are less than 1000km from DARWIN, granted we have a "big moat" [TIMOR SEA] to protect us, but as each officer will tell you "the best form of defence is attack", does this mean that the RAA may need to cross that "big moat" to do our gunnery? History has shown us that we can not assume we will never cross over again.

With FO's using GPS, SATCOM, Laser and Smart Munitions, I wonder if our past skills in the two obvious jungle techniques could now be outdated or if not practiced, even lost?

THE

RED AND BLUE

The Regiments colours are RED & BLUE, however the original colour worn by Gunners and Matrosses was RED. (A MATROSS assisted the Gunner with loading, traversing & cleaning, the rank was abolished in 1783].

Artillery was originally part of the BOARD OF ORDNANCE and was clothed by the BOARD in its standard issue RED coat trimmed with BLACK velvet. In 1689 the DUKE OF SCHOMBERG, under the Dutch born KING WILLIAM III, became the MASTER GENERAL of ORDNANCE and he dressed the artillery trains in BLUE coats, trimmed with orange (colours of the Netherlands). WILLIAM soon replaced the BLUE coat with that of the previously worn RED (done in the main to soothe patriotic discontent within England). THe colour BLUE was kept, however, for the facings and lining and the breeches and waistcoat remained BLUE also. RED and BLUE were also considered to be Royal colours.

The button holes of the coats were later strengthened with braid, or tape. The infantry for some reason used white tape, while the gunners opted for YELLOW. Eventually the officers and the senior noncommissioned officers in the artillery replaced the tape with GOLD coloured braid and in time these colours spread to the badges of rank, with the infantry wearing WHITE chevrons and the Gunners GOLD.

In the mid 18th century the Gunners changed the coat back to BLUE again; it was found that this colour was more practical in hiding the stains of flash and gunsmoke. RED then became the colour of the facing etc, and the GOLD or YELLOW, depending on the rank, remained. Some people say the Gunners colours represent the flash (RED) and the smoke (BLUE) of a cannon firing; there is nothing to substantiate this. GOLD or YELLOW, has long been a part of the Gunners colours (example: the dress of the Kings troop RHA, and the stable belt). The artillery colours as laid down in "Records of the British Army" (1895) are: SCARLET & BLUE with GOLD cord.

WO2 ARCH PAIGE 2/4th Fd Regt AIF

With time, many of our WWII Gunners have left us, some without any record and other are reported in their Regimental Journals. That's a fact of life and in the "Passing Parade" there is little we can do to acknowledge them all, their good work or service to the Corps. However, on occasion, one or two special people stand out above the rank and file. Such a Gunner was WO2 ARCH PAIGE, Secretary of the 2/4th Fd Regt AIF. ARCH was one of many, who continuously serve their Regiment, however, members within 2/4th and outsiders alike would agree that ARCH was a very special and "Rare Bloke" who live by the Gunners creed & motto "UBIQUE". When you loose such a man you have taken a devastating incoming round! On the 6th of NOV 1995, Gunner WO2 ARCH PAIGE, passed away at his ELWOOD home. He will be sadly missed.

GUNNER & GLASS MAKER

SIR ALASTAIR PILKINGTON, was born in Calcutta India on 7th Jan, 1920. He developed the revolutionary "float glass process" and went on to be company director of St Helens Pilkingtons [glass makers]. After school he went to Cambridge, in 1938 to read mechanical science. He became a reserve officer in the Royal Artillery and was posted to EGYPT a week before war was declared and was in the thick of the fighting in GREECE. He was one of the last to escape from the country. In CRETE, however, he spent precious time rounding up stragglers and when he brought them to the evacuation beach, lots had to be drawn for the few remaining places in the boats. He spent the rest of the war as a prisoner in GERMANY.

SIR ALASTAIR PILKINGTON, inventor, company director and philanthropist died in London on 5th May 1995 aged 75. [SOURCE: The Australian, 31 July 95, p14]

FROM D-DAY TO VIETNAM
MajGen DOUGLAS (TIM) VINCENT
Commander Australian Forces Vietnam
1916 - 1995

MajGen DOUGLAS (TIM) VINCENT, one of our most important Commanders, died 8th Oct 1995. Born 10th Mar 1916, MajGen Vincent pursued a career in the ADF, graduated DUNTROON 1938 and was posted into Signal Corps. He was the 3rd person in Queensland to enlist for WWII. He became the Adjutant 7.



Div Sigs during the 1941 SYRIAN Campaign. He was one of only 13 Australian Army officers attached to British Army and involved in the planning of "Operation Overlord", the D-Day landing. As a major in HQ British 30th Corps he saw action from NORMANDY to BELGIUM. In 1962 MajGen Vincent became Commander of Australian Armed Forces in the Far East, MALAYA then SINGAPORE. It was at this time he became an aviator. To most gunners it was his 1967 placement as Commander Australian Forces VIETNAM that saw gunners write another distinguished chapter to the Australian Artillery history. He retired in 1975 became active in the RSL as defence adviser and chairman and took over as national trustee of the RSL from 1993.

R.A.A.F. No3 MOBILE MET FLIGHT BORAM AIRSTRIP WEWAK


As we reported in CASCABEL No 46, [OCT 95, p30] Gunners have long

These unsung heros are owed an enormous debt of gratitude for their professional and vital all CORPS work. "Well Done and Thank You"!





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BOOK REVIEW:

The Army and the Defence of Darwin Fortress

by Robert J Rayner.

Hard cover, 403pp, Priced around \$48.00.

Published in 1995 by Rudder Press, Plumpton, NSW

Subtitled "Exploding the Myths of the Critical Phase, 'til September 1942", this book chronicles the day to day events which occurred in the greater Darwin area up to the end of 1942. The opening chapters set the scene, beginning with an appraisal of Darwin and Northern Australia's involvement with the military since 1824, through to the early part of the Second World War. Subsequent chapters detail the strengths and dispositions of the various Units, and the problems faced by them. The first air raid on the 19th of February 1942 is dealt with in great detail over four chapters, followed by details about Unit movements during the ensuing months up to September 1942.

Much of the book appears to draw heavily from the Unit War Diaries and similar material generated by the various Units which were located in the Darwin area during the first three years of the Second World War. Later chapters include snippets from interviews or the diaries and correspondence of a number of the participants.

I found this book very difficult reading, not just because of the lengthy portions of text which detail the comings and goings of Units within the general area, but also because of the author's particular style of presentation. Units are not referred to in a consistent manner, for example, the "19 Light Horse (Dismounted) Machine Gun Regiment A.M.F." is also referred to as "19 Machine Gun Regiment A.M.F.", and "19 Machine Gun Regiment". Similarly, the United States Army's 147th Field Artillery Regiment is listed as "147 U.S. Field Artillery", "147 Field Artillery Regiment", "147 Field Artillery", and the "147 F.A.". Without any cross referencing, it was at times difficult to interpret which Units were being referred to, particularly as abbreviations such as "F.A." do not appear in the list of abbreviations.

Unfortunately, the List of Abbreviations is neither complete, nor in alphabetical order, which is unforgivable, especially in these days of efficient word processors. Many abbreviations in the text do not appear in the abbreviations listing, with FA, PMG, AAOC, AASL, VID, W/Cdr, F/Lt, and HAA being a few. "AOB" and "ARP" are listed before "Amb" and "AMF", and "AOC" is sandwiched between "Aust Inf Bn" and "Arty", while "SDU" is listed between "DU" and "ED"! Curiously, the abbreviations list follows the normal convention of not having full stops between letters, but most abbreviations in the text do have full stops. But even here, there is inconsistency, as some abbreviations such as RDF, appear in the text without the full stops.

Similarly, the Index is listed in an unconventional manner, with numbered entries such as "124 Reserve Motor Transport Company" followed by "13 Infantry Brigade". Some items also appear to have multiple listings, such as "119 A.G.H." and "119 General Hospital", or "Darwin Overland Maintenance Force" and "Darwin Overland Maintenance Force (D.O.M.F.)". "P40 Kittyhawks" is also listed twice under "P", several entries apart.

The unconventional also extends to the Bibliography, which is listed with the title first, but not in alphabetical order of either title or author.

Technical aspects of the book are also questionable. The term "Bren Carriers" is often used and while this may be popular terminology, is incorrect in the Australian context, particularly as the author states that these vehicles have belts of ammunition. Hence, these are clearly Machine Gun Carriers (Carriers, MG, (Aust) LP1, 2 or 2A) armed with Vickers Medium Machine Guns. 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"DOCTORS DIARY"

War hero SIR EDWARD "Weary"
DUNLOP has been revered for his work
tending sick prisoners of war during
World War II.

But the actions of another doctor on the infamous THAI-BURMA railway came into focus with the launch of the war diaries of DR ROY MARKHAM MILLS on the 13 Dec 1995.

DR MILLS joined the army in 1941. He was captured in February 1942. In 1943, aged 26, he was the only doctor among a group of 718 men chosen by the Japanese to work in some of the most isolated railway camps.

Amid tropical heat and monsoon rains he tended prisoners weakened by hunger and suffering from cholera, dysentery, tropical ulcers and malaria,.

Often he saved lives by refusing guards demands to make sick men work and was brutally bashed. By the end of the war in 1945, CAPT MILLS had been transferred to CHANGI prison and discovered he had tuberculosis.

But he recovered and went on to be a respected physician at the Royal Newcastle Hospital. He retired in 1984 and received the Order of Australia.

Veterans Affairs Minister, MR CON SCIACCA told a gathering at his departments LaTrobe Street office, that CAPT MILLS diaries were "an extraordinary record of his magnificent fortitude, perseverance The 180-odd photographs which appear to have come from mostly private sources, are certainly interesting, and could have benefited from more extensive captions. For example, the picture captioned "Sisters Mess and Wards Bagot 119 AGH" also shows a rare Willys model MA jeep in the foreground, and the caption to the photograph of armourer Clifford Webb ".. working on equipment" does not identify the partially dismantled Lewis Light Machine Gun on the bench, a type which is often mentioned in the book.

Finally, I found the author's personal opinions intrude into the text. The tone of statements such as "Herring had been scheming to replace existing officers in key positions with his own people - old 6th Division mates", detract from the overall credibility of the book. So too, the use of the word "upcoming", which, although receiving some current usage, seems out of place in text primarily about the 1940s.

This book, while containing a wealth of detailed information and obviously the result of considerable effort by its author, is let down by its presentation. It could be improved considerably by thorough and consistent editing.

THE OXFORD COMPANION TO AUSTRALIAN MILITARY HISTORY

This book is portrayed as a "...landmark ..[which] explores the richness and diversity of Australian Military History", and it certainly goes a long way to achieving that lofty claim. With an impressive directory of contributors, the more than 800 individual entries cover a widely diverse range of subjects related to Australian military history.

The alphabetically arranged entries vary in length and detail, from a few lines to several pages. While the majority of these are concerned with specific people, places or items of equipment, there are also 36 lengthy thematic entries, such as "Aboriginal Armed Resistance to White Invasion" and "Military History and Historians". All contain a wealth of information, and are supported by 100 photographs, most of which were sourced from the Australian War Memorial. The alphabetical entries and photograph captions are generally well researched, though occasionally suffer from minor errors.

The captured A6M5 Zero fighter pictured on page 27, for example, has New Zealand Air Force markings, not Australian as stated, and the tank pictured on page 51 is actually a Vickers Medium Mark 2 (Special), not a Mark 2 as stated in the caption.

The RAAC will doubtless be interested to learn that the Leopard tank replaced the Centurion from 1974 (the Leopard was ordered in 1974, but the Leopard AS1 actually started replacing the Centurion from early 1977 following the arrival of the first batch in late 1976). Likewise, that the M113 APC (sic) (presumably the M113A1 LRV or APC) is obsolete, despite the fact that the RAAC will be using them into the next century.

In addition to the alphabetical entries, the book also has a number of useful reference sections such as "Military Ranks: Service Equivalents" and Appendices such as a list of Prime Ministers and Chiefs of Staff of the armed forces.

The preface of the book states that the authors have sought to make the coverage as comprehensive as possible but that "... the result to some extent reflects [the authors] interests and expertise ... ". This is very much the case, although it is difficult to understand why some items have extensive entries, while other, no less deserving items, do not appear at all.

For example, aircraft operated by the RAAF are listed in a concise table spanning several pages, together with a large number of individual alphabetical entries. Both sets of entries are cross referenced to further assist the reader. By contrast, there are just two entries covering armour and armoured vehicles: an entry on armour in general, and an entry on the Australian built AC-1 Cruiser tank under the name "Sentinel". Other tracked AFVs get little mention and no individual entry, despite their significant contribution to Australian military history. Wheeled armour of World War 2 is summed up in half a sentence, with no reference to either local production or the types imported.

and devotion in carrying out the oath that all doctors state - to save others lives.

The launch of the "DOCTORS DIARY AND MEMOIRS" is one of the final acts of the Australia Remembers campaign, marking 50 years since the end of World War II.

This apparent imbalance in subject coverage also extends to inconsistencies in the coverage of items within groups of materiel as well. The broad subject entry for Small Arms mentions a large number of weapons, but only a few of these have detailed individual entries. This poses the question why, for example, is the M60 GPMG deserving of an individual entry, when the M16A1 rifle and M79 grenade launcher of the same period are not? Like wise the entries for artillery: why are the 18 and 25-pounder guns entered individually, but not the 105-mm M2A2 and a host of other types?

Another aspect of consistent presentation is in the use of metric and imperial measure. Some weights and measurements are entirely in imperial, others in imperial followed by the metric equivalent in brackets, while still others are in metric only.

Despite the apparent inconsistencies and imbalance in subject coverage, this is a valuable book of reference. Its strength is in the concise and readable way in which it covers the subjects that have been chosen by the authors for listing. Since receiving this book, it has become a prime source of reference in my library, if only as a stepping off point to more detailed texts. I recommended this book to anyone interested in the broader aspects of Australian military history, though those primarily interested in items of military technology may be disappointed by the restricted extent of the coverage. Perhaps a companion volume on Australian Military Technology is also needed?


