#### JOURNAL NAME:

CASCABEL - Spanish - Origin as small bell or CAMPANILLA, [pro: KASKEBEL1, spherical bell,

knob like projection. CASCABLE - English Spelling.



FOR: REASON

Once a fixed extension left over when a muzzle loaded GUN was molten cast. It was the left over molten ore plug from the cast liquid entry point. Left on, as it was found to be a good handle to move or elevate barrel. Then shaped to look like a bell.

#### ARTILLERY USE:

After 1800AD, it became adjustable. The breech is closed in large calibres by a CASCABEL(E) screw, which is a solid block of forged wrought iron, screwed into the breech coil until it presses against the end of the smaller of the steel tube. In the smaller calibres, the A bore tube is carried through to form the CASCABEL[E]. [Ref: Text Book on Fortification Etc" Royal Military College, Sandhurst, By COL G. The name was put forward by the first Editor, LT COL ROB GAW. And accepted because of it's unique and obviously Artillery connection.

#### ASSN LOGO:

Our Association LOGO, is the 1800AD 9pdr Waterloo Field Gun. Copy is taken from Device, Badge and Motto of the Royal Regiment of Artillery, as approved in 1833, HM King William IV.

#### LAPEL BADGE:

Copy of the left arm brass gilted gun once worn by Gun Sergents above the chevrons on each arm. Brassards worn by IG's at North Head were embroided with this insignia. Selected by MAJ WARREN BARNARD 1984 Assn Committee.

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
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# The President Writes:




MAJOR FRANCIS BRIAN JACKSON 1951 - 1996

FRANCIS BRIAN JACKSON, Second in Command of the 2nd/10th Mdm Regiment, born on 29th March 1951, elder son of JOAN and the late BLAIR (Peter) JACKSON, died suddenly on the night of the 28th May 1996, while on duty with his Regiment.

A large group of Family, Friends and fellow Officers and Gunners attended the Funeral Mass with Military Honours on the 3rd June 1996, held at St James the Apostle Church, Hoppers Crossing North.

The Pall over Brians Coffin, the Australian Flag reminds us of his service to our country. MARGARET then placed flowers with Brian to symbolise a life and unfolding beauty.

The First Reading was read by MICHAEL KISS
The Second Reading was read by CRAIG
FAULKNER. FR PETER RAY offered the Homily.
Prayer of the Faithful was read by BOB
FAULKNER. Offertory Gifts were carried to the
Alter by STEPHANIE & JACKSON DESIRA.

Followed by the Liturgy of the Eucharist, Offertory Eucharistic Prayer, Communion Hymn and the Final Commendation and Farewell.

A Guard of Officers and SNCO shouldered and escorted the body of MAJOR BRIAN JACKSON to the Gun Carriage, the funeral party then slow marched with a vanguard of a Shooting Party and the 2/10 RAA Band. The funeral then proceeded to the Werribee Cemetery.

Infront of a large gathering, a graveside service was conducted with Prayers and Military Funeral functions.

The Shooting Party posted a volley of three shots, the last post, a minutes silence and prayer of committal. Family and Friends, witnessed the internment of Brian's human remains. The Rouse, concluded the service.

We wish to express our most sincere sympathy and love to MARGARET, BLAIR, SARAH and the Jackson Family.

# THE PERSONAL EXPERIENCE OF A PALL BEARER

It was early on the Wednesday when Michelle told me that Carl WOOD had rang the night before and could I ring him. I rang him anticipating every thing except the words "Brian JACKSON died last night".

So shocked was I that Michelle asked what was wrong so I wrote a note whilst listening to Carl. You could have knocked me off the chair with a feather. Whilst no stranger to death, this was different, this was family, not immediate family, but part of a much bigger and different family, all of us Gunners.

Needless to say the phones ran hot throughout our family network, all toned with the same disbelief and sorrow, perhaps some of us got an opportunity to discover our mortality earlier than we expected.

Over the coming week there was first my pride in being nominated to be a Pallbearer, then some concern over the confusion that reined in the ensuing organisation. Its a pity death doesn't fit into schedules.

On the day of the Funeral I arrived at Chapel Street as directed at 0730 to finally be briefed and then transported to the Church in Derrimut Rd.

Again briefed, we waited outside the church. As people gathered it become soon apparent that the small church would be bulging at the seams.

I met many old and familiar faces and one conversation with Mike WOMACK Ross PETERKEN and Peter WERTHEIMER is recalled in that we were here, not so much in Brians death but to celebrate his life.

I was not surprised when I noticed a General Service Sword being proffered for Brians Coffin but equally proud when asked to replace it with my Artillery sword. It looked the part under Brians slouch hat.

Soon the appointed time was on us and I was staggered at the crowd to see Jacko off. The Church service gave me time to reflect on my memories of Brian. I was particularly impressed by his cousins eulogy and yes I could picture Brian with his arm across the shoulder of a young boy speaking to him about one of his great passion, guns and gunnery. Im proud to say it bought a tear to my eyes.

It was a moving sight at the end of the service as the Senior NCOS approached to bear the weight of their 2IC and convey him to the gun carriage.

The imposing sight that greeted me as we formed up ready to receive Brians body on the gun carriage was eerie, the weather had darkened, the crowd had pressed as close as they could, school children formed up and then the band struck up

and the armed escort with band and the gun carriage and tractor flanked by pall and coffin bearers slow marched Brian away towards the cemetery.

Unfortunately after about 500m, modern reality forced us to step short, peel off and bus it to the cemetery in order to be in position to receive Brian at the Grave sight. At the grave sight the game plan changed but not withstanding that, our dignity prevailed and when the drum beat could be heard it wasn't long before Dave MILLS and his guard appeared bearing Brian to his final resting place.

Words were spoken, volleys were fired, bugles blown and all paled as the deafening minutes silence surrounded us at the grave site. As the coffin bearers folded the Pall I was moved and proud to be there, whilst a respectable member of the community who had spent so much time in duty for his country was laid to rest. Brian left us in style. Someone said it was raining, I didn't notice. After falling out, I threw a single white carnation on his coffin, saying my farewells.

On return to the Regiment I found myself behind the bar, in the mess that Brian wanted to renovate. His rough drawings were laying on the bar as a reminder of why we were there.

I lost count of the drinks I dispensed but it was a cosy but brisk environment. Yes, we had a few drinks for Brian, and not a sad word was spoken as everyone remembered his jovial self, imposing himself around us as he had in the past. Glasses were clinked, toasts made and schemes plotted as they should be in good company.

This is my personal recitation of the day Jacko was laid to rest. My farewell. I was proud to be a pall bearer in the company of Majors McDONAGH VENN, HARRIS, WARDROP AND PEARSON. I thank the Regiment for remembering me out in the vast neverland out of Corps.




JACKO, wherever you are, you will be missed but not forgotten.








FIG 4: Brig Sir William HALL, KBE KG DSO ED.

Congratulations to SANDY & RICHARD McDONAGH on the birth of their second child GUNNER ZOE McDONAGH, a sister for CLARE.



PROX FUSE TRIALS

The General Officer Commanding [GOC] Logistic Command - MAJGEN DES MUELLER, a well know Victorian Gunner based at Victoria Barracks, Melbourne was at P&EE, PORT WAKEFIELD, South Australia on his annual visit.




ABOVE: MAJGEN DES MUELLER, GOC LOG COMMD.

MAJGEN DES MUELLER, observed live ammunition testing at P&EE Range. P&EE staff had some "Big" target practice when they tested a new "Proximity fuse" for naval ordnance.

Gun Captain SGT DAVE APPO, P&EE Port Wakefield did the honours of firing about 20 rounds of 5-inch naval ammunition for the trial.

The ordnance was fired over 2700 metres at a 3.3 metre [330cm] aluminium sphere suspended between two 90 metre towers.

Admin Officer P&EE Port Wakefield, CAPT DAN WEADON reported the sphere was intended to simulate an aircraft.

"It was basically a test of the sensitivity of the fuse," CAPT WEADON said.

"We gradually moved the point of aim further away from the sphere until the round ceased to function."

CAPT WEADON said the rounds should explode close enough to the target for shrapnel to be effective.

"We tested the old fuse first, which I believe is American and we know it works."

"Then we tested an Australian made fuse that worked perfectly and will be used from now on."

The trial was a success.



The positions are generally for a 3 year period. This can be flexible, again subject to service need. It is your responsibility to maintain the technical skills that you may need when you return to the Corps. Normally, the Unit Commander of the "Non Corps" unit will release you to complete Corps training particularly courses. Communication is the key to maintaining contact with the unit and trade skills. All to often you are forgotten when you leave. If you need to keep in contact with mates and it's easy to find out what's going on in relation to social activities and technical training.

There is a life after Guns. After 6 years out of Corps, I can confirm that, a move is a refreshing change and there is a whole new life away from the Regiment.

Certainly one of the highlights of my career has been the "Non Corps" posting, meeting dozens of people with similar interests from many different units and Corps. Gaining new knowledge and skills to suit new jobs as they become available. The moves are however, only as good as you make them, if you sit on your bum and expect things to come to you, they wont!







COL Plans HQ Trg Comd (COL PETER LAWRENCE) is Chairman of then Steering Group. DARTY-A has representation on several working groups.



I REMEMBER

I remember.... I first joined the CMF with 15 Fd Regt DANDENONG in 1961, I stayed with 22 Bty (P Bty) for 11 years - from Gunner to BK.

I walked into the depot and this skinny little bloke grabbed me and started to talk me into signing up, it was Lt "Doc" HOBSON. There was hardly any other people around as National Service had just been cancelled and consequently 60%-70% of the Regiment had gone home for good.

When We went to our first camp at Pucka in March 1961, we went to "S" Block (everyone went to "S" Block at that time). Old huts, coal fired heaters, pickets at night to keep the fires going, and to wake [SGT] GEORGE BEALE and the other cooks!

The QM Staff issued me a large hessian bag and pointed to a pile of straw out the back, and that was "Bed" on the floor of the hut.

I remember....

Watching the Officers and Sergeants go into dinner every night of the first week in their Blues.

Unboxing 25Pdr Ammo for the first time and being deathly afraid that it would go off, until WO2 WALLY CULPITT came along with the

sand falling out of his Desert Boots and kicked a few of the rounds around just to show us new comers how safe it all was, he didn't kick the cartridges around thoughthank God!

#### "Cartridge only unload"

Sitting on the Gun waiting to fire it, nervous and scared stiff, after a few days of training as a layer, little WO2 JIMMY FUNGE came along and chatted quietly to us about anything, and everything until the fire orders came, then I was too busy to be nervous. After the Gun went off what a great feeling of satisfaction and excitement that I could control this huge machine.

Waiting for fire orders after one of the other Guns had been adjusting, there was a fairly long delay from the OP, so the GPO ordered "Cartridge only unload". Naturally the only Gun to take any action was the adjusting Gun.

Then the order "Load" was given. My Gun Sergeant, KEN JOHNSON gave the order to load, but immediately a "Roar" burst out of the gathering dusk from our Bty Guide [BG], WOZ MAL BUGG - "No 1 Gun you've got a round up the spout, cartridge only load".

Well KEN was a touch taken aback at this, and he also stuttered a little under stress. So he said "B B B B But.." and that's as far as he got. This great roar came again "Cartridge only load, are you going to argue with me?" and mal started shaking his half finger in KEN's face.

Seeing KEN was only half the size of big MAL, he decided he didn't want a half finger stuck up his nose, so he shrugged and said in a quite kind of way "Cartridge only load".

Then we were ordered to "Fire" - we lit up the place for miles and started a nice little grass fire out front. I don't think MAL knew whether to laugh or cry, but he spent the next few days wandering around trying to figure out how to make a round with no cartridge disappear before the end of camp.

I remember....

Sitting on the layers seat in the middle of a Fire Mission and feeling the Gun start to slide down the hill, as we were firing, I remember jumping off the layers seat very bloody quickly!!

Crawling out of a "Hootchy" in the early

morning, frost on the ground, sun coming up and the Magpies carolling away fit to burst, it made you glad to be alive.

NIGHT OCCYS - no lights, trying not to make any noise, mist rising up, drivers trying to follow the white marker on the back of their Gun Sergeant, sometimes almost running them over, which at different times we thought was probably a good idea anyhow.

Pin points of light flashing on and off all over the Gun position, trying to find the "Director" light through the dial sight-"Who's that useless prick standing in the way of the light! Oops!! Sorry Sir!!"

#### TASMANIA & L5'S

A Night Occy in TASMANIA, our first year with the L5'S. Enemy rushing through the position firing blanks and hand held flares. One flare misfired and flew horizontally straight into the forehead of one of the Gunners. Five minutes later a yell from one of the Guncrews "MEDIC!!" - One of the crew had been using his finger in the dark to match up the holes in one of the "Trail Sections" instead of the bolt. Someone pushed the trail a bit too hard and NO FINGER. Two diggers off to hospital within tem minutes, strewth!! What a night. But the first round went down range on time at 0100hr.

A BC who refused to let us refer to our soldiers as "Diggers", they were "Christian Souls" - I thought that at times some of them looked very un-christian indeed.

Our first camp in TASMANIA, crash action in the middle of the main North-South Highway, the local travellers didn't mind, they all gathered around to watch. Free meals at the local restaurants. double page spreads in the local paper. We weren't sure whether we were still in Australia or possibly we had been turned into Americans.

#### JAMIESON CREEK CAMP

The JAMIESON CREEK CAMP, towing our Gun up FLOUR BAG Hill around the old narrow State Electricity Commission [S.E.C.] track and looking out the passenger seat of a "Gemmy", watching the outside rear dual wheel spinning in mid air with a 500 metre drop below, I only looked once!

Having to unhitch the Guns and manhandle them around some of the corners as they were too narrow for the Gun towers to tow the Gun around.

Being towed up one of the steeper hills with two Gun towers and two Guns hitched in tandem behind and engineer bulldozer.

Hearing that 2 FIELD REGIMENT could not get their track and were staying around the [Lake] EILDON area and thinking what a mob of wimps they were (Don't forget I was young and foolish in those days!).

Coming off picket on a freezing cold night on the range and wandering up to the old WILES COOKER tucked away up the back. Opening the door and entering a different world - of steam, light and warmth. A hot cup of tea and a fried egg sandwich made the world seem right again.

#### 7RAR, CENTURION TANKS & VIETNAM

A combined Armour/Arty/Inf Exercise with 7 RAR just before they went to VIETNAM for their first tour. I was the FO with D-Coy, 7 RAR, I'd never seen so many soldiers carrying so much on their back before. We walked over the top of every flaming hill on Pucka Range. Every night the Coy Comd camped right on the top of a hill, and he made me sleep right on the peak.

Trudging along with the Coy and a troop of Centurion tanks, not interested in the country simply trying to keep out of the tanks tracks in case they "Angel" back down the hill (which was a regular feature of them at that stage of their life). One in fact did go, on the hill next door, spectacular sight crashing back down through the trees, with diggers running for their lives. The Crew Commander hanging on for grim death. Fortunately it rolled out onto level ground and calm was restored.

Watching the Crew Commanders drinking their hot cocoa every couple of hours, and wishing for their tank to throw a track so they would be tired, wet and miserable like the rest of us.

Walking with the Tank Troop Commander (a baby faced ANGUS McNEILAGE), just behind the Coy Commander and constantly querying his "Loc Stats" (at one stage he believed us to be "Three miles off the coast in BASS STRAIT"). ANGUS wondered how his tanks were swimming, but the Coy Commander couldn't see the funny side. We decided the Infantry must have been using maps of VIETNAM in advance.


#### CVT & LIGHT REFLECTORS

An incident while I was GPO of a 6 Gun Battery (GPO is absolutely the very best job in the Army for a Lieutenant, closely followed by a Troop Commander in a Reconnaissance Squadron). We were ordered to fire a CVT Fire Mission after the OP had ordered "Cease Fire", but had almost immediately changed their mind, and ordered another Fire Mission. The Guns were almost packed, but were not yet out of action, you can probably imagine the pleased comments from the No's 1 when they were ordered to "take Post" again.

The adjusting went fine and everything was normal until I ordered "Fire for Effect with CVT", when the Guns fired there was an almighty double explosion. The first, from the Guns firing and the second from a muzzle premature. There was shrapnel and holes everywhere and in everything. The Command Post tent looked like a sieve. The only thing that damned round did not hit was people! It was a miracle.

After everyone sat down and had a strong cup of tea, it was found that one of our faster No's 1 had packed his Gun to the point where his muzzle cover was on, and had forgotten to take it off again in the rush to bring the Gun back into action. The CVT round arms itself (or did in those days) on "set back" and was ready to fire as it left the barrel. Unfortunately, the muzzle cover had a reflector on it, and the impact of that reflector was enough to set the round off.














ABOVE: Annual Camp Feb 7th 1971, 22 Bty, Tas.

Being extremely keen and never missing an opportunity, our ADJT had all the shrapnel marked and the round impact traced. He then gave a lesson on the shape of impact of a round. The lesson was extremely well received, I don't think anyone ever forgot it.

MATT BOLTONG never did find his reflector!!!

#### I remember ...

In the middle of the night on the range. Everything dark, no noise or lights. Then the word goes around the Guns "Salvo's Up" and off we would stumble over to the track. There would be the local SALVO in his blacked out landrover with steaming hot cocoa for everyone - Thank God for the Salvos.

Squatting over a hole on a steep hillside letting nature take its course, hoping desperately that the shovel I was hanging onto wouldn't come out of the ground. Twenty years later after I had transferred to Armoured Corp, I also had to worry where the top half of my tank suit way laying.

Sitting on the OP on a frosty April morning watching the sun burn the mist off the hills and gradually revealing Pucka Range in all its stark beauty. Feeling the sun gradually warm my bones.

I remember!



125th BIRTHDAY
"A" FIELD BATTERY

This year marks the 125th Birthday of "A" Fd Bty, RAA. "A" Fd Bty is Australians oldest regular Army sub-unit [located at 8/12th Mdm Regt, NSW]. It has recorded continuous regular service from 1871.

This birthday more importantly we celebrate the birth of the Royal regiment of Australian Artillery. "A" Fd Bty is the fortunate custodian of Gunner history by virtue of being the first Battery raised in what was to be the Australian Defence Force of the Commonwealth of Australia, in 1901.

"A" Fd Bty is a link in a chain. That chain being all the regiments of the Corps, ARA & GRes alike. None being more blessed than one or the other. We are the custodians of the Australian Gunner tradition.

I believe we have given honour to the Corps and will continue to do so while we enjoy the respect of our fellow Gunners.

#### THE START

The NSW Parliament enacted the NAVAL & MILITARY FORCE ACT 1871. With the proclamation, by th Earl of Belmore, Governor of New South Wales, Earl of Belmore raised the NSW Permanent Artillery, on the 1st August 1871. [R3]. This Act gave law to the formation of a Permanent Force and the raising of an establishment for a FIELD ARTILLERY BATTERY.

Whilst enlistments and attestation did not occur on the day of proclamation, it is obvious that the military and the politicians had agreed on the force composition and strengths well before the act was passed. It was within the 1st-7th August 1871, that the "Nuts & Bolts", Officers, NCO's and Gunners were formerly medicaled and sworn in.

#### SOME IMPORTANT FACTS

\* The Battery has Australias first enlisted soldier: SSGT HENRY THOMAS GREEN. His Army number was "No1". He had served in the CRIMEA & INDIA.

The first BC was CAPT G. AIREY.
The first Gunner KIA, was GNR E.LEWIS. His body was interned at SUAKIM, EGYPT.
The Mascot (Totem) is the ubiquitous "Road

Runner" of DISNEY cartoon fame. By authority of DISNEY, USA, 1962.



#### ON ACTIVE SERVICE

"A" Fd Bty has seen action in - Sudan 1885, South Africa 1900-01, ANZAC 1915, France & Belgium 1916-18, New Guinea 1943-44, Bougainville 1945, Japan 1946-48, Malaya 1948-60, and Vietnam 1971.

#### LEFT SHOULDER LANYARD

All units wore the lanyard on their left shoulder up to 1920. Then due to problems with the removal of a knife from the left hand breast pocket, due to the bandoleer being over that shoulder - the RAA changed shoulders to the right.

Australia followed the change, but "A" Fd Bty decided it would not change its dress regulations and kept the lanyard on the left.

There is no truth to the common story line that the Prince Of Wales authorised the batterys left shoulder stance. [R4].

#### TODAYS BATTERY

Today [96] MAJOR DON.J. SMITH commands the Batteries L119 HAMEL GUNS [c1989] & L118 ABBOT Barrel, as a mobile support Bty [Airborne] attached to 3 RAR. The Battery is located & the responsibility of 8th/12th Mdm Regt, Coral Lines, Liverpool. [The other sister being 103 Bty, with it's M198].

Other task: 4 Fd Regt ODF role, Depot Bty for the School and occasionally does VIP Gun

Salutes at Canberra.

The Battery has a Museum in the Bty Lines (The Henry Green Room) that also serves as the BC conference room.

The Battery Motto is "SEMPER PARATUS" [always ready].

When she returned, she looked into the kitchen, here was the old Gunner and the cat, sound asleep, the stove stone cold. With the best voice she could muster, she shouted:


"the.. FIRE!"

EXTRA NOTES ON MONASH THE MAN

It is good to see SIR JOHN MONASH honored on the new \$100 note, but strange that the background illustrations made no reference to the greater part of his life's work. The accompanying article refers to him only as "military commander and university namesake".


The full facts are readily available in GEOFFREY SERLES biography. MONASH had degrees in civil engineering (MCE) and law (LLB). Before leaving for World War I at the age of 39, he had enjoyed an intensely active career in the design, construction and analysis of projects in civil, mechanical and mining engineering, in patent work, and as an expert witness in major legal disputes over engineering contracts and technical matters.

It was in these enterprises, perhaps more than in the militia, that he learnt to know and respect the resourceful and independent minded men who formed the AIF.

In promoting and organising construction work, he learnt and honed the political, managerial and analytical skills that made him a great commander - in particular his ability to handle a large volume of work under high pressure and withstand inevitable setbacks, his meticulous attention to detail, and his insistence on clear and precise communication both up and down the chain of command.

After the war, he devoted the last Il years of his life to his visionary work in establishing and developing the State Electricity Commission of Victoria.

In 1917 MONASH wrote home to his wife 'I hate the business of war and soldiering with a loathing that I cannot describe - the awful horror of it, the waste, the destruction and the inefficiency. My only consolation has been the sense of faithfully doing my duty to my country...."



A second edition of the \$100 note could present a more balanced view of his contribution to Australia by including people at work on design computations and at the drawing board; people building bridges, dams, water tanks, warehouses, wharves, electricity transmission lines and a Yallourn Power Station or two.


SIR WILLIAM addressed the gathering, attended by Family Members, Ministers, RSL Executives and guests to witnesses the occasion.

A KURT WIESE spent some time in the camp during the war, after his time was up, he returned to the USA as an illustrator for WALT DISNEY'S and did the animation feature "BAMBI".

JUSTICE O'KEEFE adds that several Germans escaped via a 120 metre long tunnel and stowed away on a ship to Java never to be apprehended.

#### NEW AIRPORT

At present Holsworthy is still an option for Sydneys second major airport, than is if Badgery Creek fails its next environmental impact statement.

#### GUNNERS WHO LITTER

I noticed in the April edition of CASCABEL #48, an article showing the device, badge and motto of the Royal Regiment of Artillery as approved in 1833 by HM KING WILLIAM IV.

It would appear that the motto;

"Quo Fas et Gloria Ducunt"

with the word "UBIQUE" in front of it is the motto used today for Artillery Regiments in Australia. My query is - The 2nd MEDIUM BRIGADE formed in Australia in 1925 had a motto;

"Ubique Consenda et Stabilis"

A rough interpretation;

"Every Where United We Stand"

Why was this motto different to all the other RAA Regiments?

The uniform worn was the same, jacket, britches, leggings and spurs, though at no time were the Guns 6-inch Howitzers & 60 pounders drawn by horses.

The only difference I can remember was that no belt was worn with this dress, which included a bandoleer.

"THE FORCE OF LAW"
INTERNATIONAL LAW AND THE LAND COMMANDER

EDITED BY HUGH SMITH

The Chief of the General Staff Exercise in 1994 explored the responsibilities of land commanders under the international laws of armed conflict in a contemporary context.

Conflict in the later part of the 20th Century has seen civilians increasingly embroiled in hostilities; operations are undertaken by multi-national forces which may be to a greater or less degree under united Nations auspices or control; authority is doubtful and the basic elements of law and justice are absent in the area concerned.

We have some rules. These are conveniently grouped and briefly described in an appendix to this volume based on a recent Army Occasional Paper. But the question is do they take proper account of the changing nature of conflict?

There are some 17 contributors to this volume from Australia, Switzerland, Singapore, the United Kingdom and United States defence forces and from the UN and International Red Cross. People with special skills such as World Vision, Care Australia, diplomats, lawyers, academics and a variety of government departments also contributed to the exercise.

The volume is divided into sections which give perspectives on diplomatic and legal aspects, and the problems facing commanders in the field. A section on special protection canvasses the problem of victims of war, refugees and environmental issues.

Four case studies are examined. As one would expect, there is a wide range of topics dealt with competently and interestingly.

The military reader will perhaps find the case studies of major interest; in particular the papers on "Desert Storm" and "Operation Solace". Of equal interest is the paper dealing with environmental issues which give a perspective not usually encountered.

The Editor, HUGH SMITH, makes a notable contribution in the conclusion which pulls it together in a very able fashion. It is not a message of hope, but it illuminates the need for nations to apply themselves assiduously to responding to change and progressively develop internationally accepted protocols to curb the abuse of human rights. It also highlights the problem for the Australian Defence Force in ensuring that commanders and staff have and maintain a sound knowledge of the many ramifications of this complex subject.


This book will become a standard reference in this process.


