



JOURNAL NAME:

CASCABEL - Spanish - Origin as small bell or ASSN LOGO: Campanilla (pro: Kaskebell), spherical bell, knob like projection.

CASCABLE - English spelling.





REASON FOR:

Once a fixed extension left over when a muzzle loaded gun was molten cast. It was the POSTAL ADDRESS: left over molten ore plug from the cast liquid entry point. Left on as it was found to be a good handle to move or elevate the barrel. Then shaped to look like a bell.

ARTILLERY USE:

After 1800 AD, it became adjustable. The breech is closed in large calibres by a CASCABEL(E) screw, which is a solid block of forged wrought iron, screwed into the breach coil until it pressed against the end of the steel tube. In the smaller calibres, the A bore tube is carried through to form the CASCABEL(E).

CASCABEL HISTORY:

The name was put forward by the first editor, LTCOL Rob Gaw, and accepted because of its unique and obvious Artillery connection.

Our Assn Logo is the 1800 AD 9pdr Waterloo Field Gun. Copy is taken from Device, Badge and Motto of the Royal Regiment of Artillery, as approved in 1883, by HM King William IV.

LAPEL BADGE:

Copy of the left arm brass gilted gun once worn by Gun Sgts above the chevrons on each arm. Brassards worn by IGs at North Head were embroided with this insignia. Selected by MAJ Warren Barnard, 1984 Assn Committee.



The Secretary's Report from the A.G.M.

The Commanding Officer of 2nd/10th Medium Regiment, LTCOL C. R. Wood, was invited to report on the state of the Regiment, and noted:

ORGANISATIONAL

- * Army is in a state of change, with adjustment from a World War I organisation to one based on independent Task Forces.
- * His Regiment is Under Command 4 Brigade with effect from 1st July 1997; this has little effect as he reports to the same headquarters.
- * All indirect fire support is to be by RAA, including mortars.
- * 4 Brigade is doing trials of full/part time mix the full time staff of this Regiment will double, which is seen as a positive move of benefit to the Regiment.
- * The aim is to revitalise the Reserve in 4 Brigade.

UNIT

- * He is satisified he has the strongest Reserve unit and confident of the standard achieved. The AIF trophy has returned to 2/10 Medium Regiment.
- * Strong recruiting towards the end of the year should add 100 to 120 soldiers.

BATTERIES

- * 22 Battery is strong and will combine in a single depot in the next twelve months. Hamel is to replace the M2A2 when a new depot is found. The battery's camp in Tasmania was a success, including ARTEP assessment.
- * 38 Battery has experienced some attrition in numbers, especially in the junior NCO ranks; this will be helped by supplementing with Regular NCOs. The battery will do its camp at High Range near Townsville in late April early May, and will be assessed. Colac depot is to be retained with two M198 equipments there. Identification of a depot in Hoppers Crossing area is still being done.

CORPS

- * The School of Artillery is to be opened at Puckapunyal in March.
- * The Head of Corps is to be lost, and the higher headquarters role (previously by Commander Land Command Artillery) will be taken over by COL S. Joske as Colonel Artillery.

Comments by Colonel Commandant, BRIG G. B. Standish AM, RFD, ED, in his address on Corps matters, noted the constancy of change and that the rate of change is increasing. Points covered included:

RAA CONFERENCE

- * Head of Corps will be replaced in an honorary capacity by the Colonel Artillery, or possibly the Commanding Officer of the School.
- * Training Command becomes Readyness Command, which will include all bands.
- Support Command is to be tri-service.
- * Commander Land Command will issue a directive regarding safety and level of expertise, but Colonel Artillery will retain technical direction of Artillery.
- * 2/10 Mdm Regt will in time have ten percent full-time personnel.
- * Melbourne and Perth are to trial a common induction of all recruits, of six weeks continuous training, which could create work problems for potential Reserve members.
- * A rewrite of the Strategic Plan has been done, as well as a draft update of RAA Standing Orders.

REGIMENTAL COMMITTEE

- * It is hoped that the location of the Museum at North Head will be retained by Army. It is an excellent museum.
- * Items of memorabilia are available to units but will need to be insured.

The rate for the year ending 30 Jun 98 was set at \$12, and the rate for Life Membership was set at \$120. There are a number of members in advance so there is no need for any member to pay until you receive a notice.

CALL FOR SUPPORT FROM LIFE MEMBERS

In addition to the rate of subscriptions being set at the AGM there was discussion about the change in income to the Association over the years between the relativity of annual and life members. A motion was moved from the floor to redress the situation. By way of background, a few years ago a member taking up life membership in say 1989 paid \$80. This amount was invested at 17% and generated \$13 interest. In addition, the total fee of \$80 was gradually brought to account as

subscription income over a nominal 20 year period, producing further revenue of \$4. This meant an annual revenue of \$17. An annual member at that time paid \$8. A member who joined in the last 12 months paid \$100 for life membership, which was invested at 4%, and generated \$4, together with a part of the fee spread over 20 years of a further \$5, making a total income from the life member of \$9. Life members who paid at the \$50 or \$80 level produce smaller incomes of \$4.50 and \$7.20 respectively. This compared to an annual members contribuion of \$10. The balance had moved quite a lot over the years, caused mainly by the 76% reduction in interest rates. Following lengthy discussion it was moved from the floor, and then resolved that all life members who had paid \$100 or less be asked for a voluntary donation of \$20 to top up the amount being invested. Notices to all life members in this category will be sent out calling for donations to assist in redressing this issue. I trust this measure will result in good support from life members.

FAREWELL TO NORTH HEAD

You will be aware that the Artillery Centre is to be relocated from its home of fifty years at North Head, Manly to Puckapunyal, as part of the Defence Forces plans to reorganise. The idea of placing the School of Artillery close to an artillery firing range has much to be commended but the culture shock of moving from Manly to Pucka I fear will be quite a cross to bear.


As far as is known the move is to take place at the end of 1997 so that courses can begin in the new school in 1998. The Artillery Centre will be accommodated in new purpose built premises on the site previously occupied by 1st Armoured Regiment. The complex is to be named, "Bridges Barracks".

Whilst the move will actually occur during December this year the farewell functions were held during the first weekend of August in conjunction with corps functions which usually happen at that time They are the Gunner Dinner, the Corps Conference and the RAA Regimental Committee. Added to these were a church parade, "Freedom of Entry to the City of Manly" ceremonies, Sergeants' and Officers' Mess farewells, a cocktail party and a "Beating Retreat" ceremony.

Mina and I arrived in Manly on Friday 1st August and booked into the Paradise Motel on the beach front. The proprietor welcomed us with the remark that, yes he had a booking for Taggart, one of the people here for a weekend of debauchery up at the Head.

We attended Saint Matthew's Church in the Corso for the Church Parade on Friday morning. Major General Stevenson attended as well as several of the other states Colonels Commandant. Naturally the Director, Colonel Retter attended together with many senior officers. The Queen's Banner was paraded and laid up on the alter during the service. The service was a suitable beginning to the weekend's activities and a little different to the usual activities on the Corso.

On Friday evening both Officer's and Sergeant's Messes held Happy Hours. We attended the Officer's Mess. The bar was shoulder to shoulder but worth waiting for. It was there that I met John Griggs whom some may remember as Adjutant of 8th Medium Regiment in Geelong and later as Deputy Commander 3rd Training Group.



There was supposed to be a break between the happy hour and the cocktail party but it just seemed to go on and on. There were speeches and replies, we all talked knowledgeably about the Long Tan Painting and had a great time. Here I met Brigadier Paul Tys whom I last saw whilst we were both students at the School in

1971. Paul was briefly the public relations spokesman for the Services and you may have seen him on the telly recently.

Saturday was the big day. During the morning there was the ceremony of the "Freedom of Entry to the City of Manly". There was an impressive ceremony on the parade ground at North Head followed by the challenge in the main street and a mounted parade through the streets of the city. The parade included one of all the present and past equipments including my favourite "Five Point Five" and several radar looking machines that I did not recognise. It was a most impressive procession.

After lunch the School and the Museum were open to the public. The School had stands showing all the current equipments including guns, computers and survey gear. All very puzzling to a steam gunner like me. The Museum developed considerably since I saw it a year ago. It really is a credit to the organisers and any opportunity to visit should not be missed. The general idea seems to be to develop rooms with a specific theme. In the main building there are rooms for Viet Nam, the Coastal forts of all of Australia, Medals, Technical instruments and new since I was there last year an Ammunition room. In there is one of anything you can think of including fuse setters. There are several hangers in the grounds, one each for First World War, Second World War and Anti-aircraft artillery. In the grounds are several big guns too large for the hangers. All the equipment is as far as possible set out in realistic settings. I ran into Major Peter Wood in the AA room. He was in Sydney on family business and only heard by accident about the celebrations whilst he was there. I did not have time to see the tunnels and gun emplacements on this occasion which was disappointing. When you visit you can have a cup of tea in the new tearooms which are located in one of the old married quarters just outside the gate. The whole Museum is very well done.

At dusk the," Beating Retreat", ceremony was conducted on the parade ground. There were two guards and the band of 23rd Field Regiment and with a battery of guns in the background. It was an impressive ceremony and was followed by the firing of a, "Feu de Joie" by the dismounted troops and guns very cleverly integrated.

The parade was followed by a cocktail party held in the ballroom on the upper floor of the main barracks building. The School will miss this room. During the evening Lt Col Collie CO/Cl of the School made a farewell speech and concluded by making a presentation to The Mayor of the City of Manly. The presentation was the School of Artillery Standard in a magnificent frame.



This function was the last that I attended but the more serious activities such as the Regimental Committee and Corps Conference continued on Sunday and Monday. The Sergeant's Mess held farewells on Monday night. Mina and I left on Sunday morning after a pleasant and historic weekend.

Relocation of the Artillery Centre By Lieutenant Colonel J.C. Platt

The Artillery Centre, which comprises the Directorate of Artillery and the School of Artillery, will relocate to Puckapunyal in Victoria at the end of 1997. Not surprisingly, most 'Gunners' relate to the School when they think of our current location at North Head. The School is the largest element of the Centre and has been located at North Head for 51 years, and in the Sydney area for 111 years. Most RAA gunners have at some time trained at the School.

Sydney has changed since the School of Artillery was raised in 1885, it is no longer possible to conduct live firing on the 'fields beyond Paddington', Holsworthy is constrained and restricted to the point of being unsuitable, and Singleton is more than three hours travelling time. The relocation to Puckapunyal will enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of RAA individual training by providing new purpose built facilities, in close proximity to an excellent field firing range and the establishment of a field artillery support unit for live firing and deployment training.

The Artillery Centre will occupy the site of the former Robertson Barracks. New buildings will be constructed and there will be an adaptive use of existing buildings. The total cost of the project is approximately \$34 million. The field firing range is 324 km2, in size, and can be used for deployment and live firing training. The size of the area allows for variation in terrain, vegetation, and accessibility; and caters for the needs of both field artillery and air defence weapon systems.

As part of individual artillery training there is a requirement for the tactical manoeuvre associated with deployment training. The School currently does not have the personnel or sufficient equipment to conduct live firing or deployment training for the students under instruction, this support is provided from the Artillery units of the Land Command. A critical advantage achieved with the relocation will be the raising of the depot support battery to provide this essential support.

The relocation of the Artillery Centre is an emotional issue, so is any form of change! We will all miss North Head. it has been our *Alma Mater* for a long time. The Manly Community will also miss us and the outstanding rapport that has been built over generations. But, clearly there are great advantages that will be afforded when we are established in our new home at Puckapunyal. It is a move for advantage!

EXERCISE RHINO CHARGE 97

6/13 Fd Regt, in Direct Support of 9 Bde, participated in Exercise Rhino Charge 97 at Cultana and Broken Hill during the period 3 to 17 May 1997. The Exercise was the culmination of the Brigade 3 year training cycle. The Regiment, comprising three fire units (ie.16 Fd Bty, 48 Fd Bty and a composite mortar platoon from 10/27 Bn and 12/40 Bn) conducted live firing and movement at Cultana during 4 to 9 May, followed by training in `short warning conflict' in Broken Hill and its surrounds.

The aim of the Exercise was to provide indirect fire support, and fire support coordination to 9 Bde, thus the following Artillery Operation Order Mission Statement evolved:

"6/13 Fd Regt is to conduct lead up training in Area of Operation (AO) FLYNN in order to support 9 Bde operations in AO RASP, through the coordination of offensive support, management of airspace, provision of artillery fire, and conduct of protective operations ".

The key Regimental personnel during the Exercise were CO, LTCOL Aldo Piristi, Ops Offr, Maj Geoff Robertson, BC 16 Fd Bty, Maj John Findlay, BC 48 Fd Bty, Maj Dan Ryan, and OC Composite Mortar Pl, Capt Werner Lausberg.

An integrated Regimental HQ, Joint Offensive Support Coordination Centre (JOSCC - previously termed Fire Support Coordination Centre, FSCC) was established for the Exercise. This HQ performed the functions of Director of Practice, Safety Command Post and Regimental Command Post, and coordinated both the live firing exercise and the tasking of a troop of Kiowa light observation helicopters (LOH) from 161 Recce Sqn which were allocated In Support.

Live firing sub units conducted fire and movement in Tactical Areas of Operations which were named in honour of previous 13 Fd Regt CO's, namely Thomson, Stoba, Olsson and Pope.

During the live firing phase all Forward Observers (FO's) and Mortar Fire Controllers (MFC's) had the opportunity to conduct one or more Air OP missions. The live firing activity culminated in a Regimental fire plan, including a direct firing shoot supported by mortars and machine guns employed in a `sustained fire' role (the older members will recall the Vickers MG being used in this role); this latter event was the highlight of the Exercise for the Gunners.

During the first week of the Exercise all soldiers were given the opportunity to gain familiarisation with the Kiowa LOH (approx 150 personnel were trained).

The second week saw the Regiment deploy to Broken Hill into two Regimental TAORs in support of Bde close asset protection, surveillance operations, and company offensive operations.

As part of the Bde program during this phase, each rifle company conducted two offensive operations against `real' enemy platoon positions. This involved a mixture of company attacks and company area ambushes. Depending on the activity, each company was provided with a variety of Bde assets including, for each action, an artillery section in Direct Support.

My concluding remarks in the Post Activity Report summarise the value to the Regiment of participation in the Exercise:

"The successful completion of the Rhino Charge 97 Exercise was a significant achievement, given the minimal personnel and resources available to the Regiment. This was testimony to the spirit of dedication to the Corps of key personnel in the Regiment and sub units, and of all ranks.

Whilst the live firing phase was the most complex, demanding and technically challenging for some 24 years, the cross section and variety of training substantially contributed to the maintenance of morale and retention in all sub units.

In addition, long overdue Regimental training, whilst somewhat limited, has substantially advanced the corporate knowledge and understanding (of techniques and procedures at the Regt level) of those members participating ".



"Can You Tell Us Why?" asked SGT H. T. James and we are pleased to report that two members have kindly responded as follows:

Regarding the query from Sgt H. T. James in CASCABEL No 49. Jul 96 - 'Can you tell us why' page 32, where he asks about the motto of 2 Mdm Bde and which he says was "Ubique Consensu et Stabiles".

I still have in my possession my original RAA cap badge which was issued to me at 10 Fd Regt Frankston in 1953 and the motte on it is as follows:

"UBIQUE" "CONSENSU STABILES" "AUSTRALIA"



Now that the subject has arisen, I realise that I never did discover the meaning of 'Consensu Stabiles'. Perhaps as a

result of this article, I shall at last find out.

I would point out that the word 'Ubique' is used on its own, as on the RAA 'collar dog' Everywhere' - meaning that artillery serves on every battle front. Wherever there is a battle - artillery is in it.

Bearing in mind the foregoing, I would assume that originally the motto of the Royal Australian Artillery was "Ubique" plus "Consensu Stabiles" and that subsequently Australian artillery adopted the motto of the Royal Artillery.

I hope that this information will be of some help to the discussion.

I refer to the question of Artillery Mottoes raised by Sgt H.T. James on page 32 of Cascabel No 49.

In the years between WWI and WWII Australian Artillery in general used a badge with, beneath the gun, the motto CONSENSU STABILES, translation "In accord and dependable". (In the days when we were horse drawn the gunners` translation was "Constantly in Stables", this referred to the many hours spent feeding (4 times a day), watering, grooming, mixing feeds, and performing horse line piquet duty.

The present badge with the motto QUO FAS ET GLORIA DUCUNT "Where Duty and Glory Lead' was adopted, probably in the late 1930's, to be consistent with that used by the Royal Artillery.

I have both of these badges in my possession.
