





JOURNAL NAME:

CASCABEL - Spanish - Origin as small bell or Campanilla (pro: Kaskebell), spherical bell, knob like projection.





CASCABLE - English spelling. REASON FOR:

Once a fixed extension left over when a muzzle loaded gun was molten cast. It was the left over molten ore plug from the cast liquid entry point. Left on as it was found to be a good handle to move or elevate the barrel. Then shaped to look like a bell.

ARTILLERY USE:

After 1800 AD, it became adjustable. The breech is closed in large calibres by a CASCABEL(E) screw, which is a solid block of forged wrought iron, screwed into the breach coil until it pressed against the end of the steel tube. In the smaller calibres, the A bore tube is carried through to form the CASCABEL(E).

The name was put forward by the first editor, LTCOL Rob Gaw, and accepted because of its unique and obvious Artillery connection.

ASSN LOGO:

Our Assn Logo is the 1800 AD 9 Pdr Waterloo Field Gun. Copy is taken from Device, Badge and Motto of the Royal Regiment of Artillery, as approved in 1883, by HM King William IV.

LAPEL BADGE:

Copy of the left arm brass gilded gun once worn by Gun Sgts above the chevrons on each arm. Brassards worn by IGs at North Head were embroided with this insignia. Selected by MAJ Warren Barnard, 1984 Assn Committee.

Book Revue

THE BROKEN EIGHTH

A History of the 2/14 th Australian Field Regiment

Author- Ron Jackson, printed and published by Clipper Press. Ashwood, Vic. Hard cover, 158 b & w photos, 6 maps, 10 dwgs, xi/305 pp, Roll of Honour, list of awards, nom roll, no index or bibliography.

This is not a "military" history in the accepted sense. It does not deal with the wide sweep of events in the Pacific War, evaluate the decisions of commanders or examine strategy and tactics; but it does tell in a plain and straight forward fashion the story of a gunner regiment from its formation in 1940 until its disbandment at war's end. The author has drawn skilfully on the official war diaries lodged in the Australian War Memorial, the memories of his comrades, their photographs and sketches, together with items in news-sheets produced in the regiment such as "Zero Line News", "The Premature Burst" and "The Whistle". "The Drum" started in 1955 by the post-war regimental Association was also a valuable source.

Some 700 ordinary Australian men came together in 1940 at Puckapunyal to form one of the major units of the 8th Australian Division. They pooled their talents, skills and intelligence to build a regiment fit in all respects for operational service. This they achieved despite a lack of many basic resources. They also achieved, although many would not have recognised it at the time, an exceedingly strong regimental spirit which was to stand them in good stead in adventures which lay ahead.

Firstly was their long and arduous service in Darwin under a perceived threat of Japanese invasion and during some 50 air raids. The loss of their companion units in the 8th Division in 1942 as the Japanese successively captured Malaya, Singapore, Ambon, Timor and New Britain was sorely felt by the regiment. It was now the sole remaining major combat unit of the Division. To mark this sad circumstance a perpendicular 'break' was inserted in the regimental colour patch to signify 'The Broken Eighth'

After a period of re-equipment and training in NSW and Queensland, the regiment embarked for New Guinea and operations with 5th Australian Division along the north coast of the Huon Peninsula to Alexishafen. The turn of the year saw the regiment move to Jacquinot Bay. New Britain for further operations in support of units of 5th Division. The task was to isolate the very large force of Japanese in the Gazelle Peninsula. The regiment again showed its reliability and ability in some sharp actions in the Open Bay and Wide Bay areas. The cessation of hostilities led to a period of garrison duty in Rabaul where for the last time, the regiment demonstrated its

amazing 'can do' attitude so carefully nurtured from those far off days in 1940. It returned home for disbandment in December I 945.

"The Broken Eighth" is an attractive, quality production with a 'good feel' to it. It 1s a credit to Clipper Press and Ron Jackson. While it is sad that so many years have passed before the 2/l 4th Australian Field Regiment had its story told. I am sure that it will prove of much interest to the families of those who served and will bring back memories to those members of the regiment still with us. It should also find a deserved place with the histories of other distinguished units of the Australian Army on the shelves of any military library.

REGIMENTAL SURVEYORS TAKE NOTE GLOBAL POSITIONING SYSTEM

In this day of computers and orbiting satellites there is no need to maintain the skills of the surveyors.

Due to the easy availability of the hand held Global Positioning System receivers for under \$1000 it is now far easier to remove survey parties from the manning of the regiments of batteries and issue a hand held GPS instead.

Gone are the days where we had to pull survey chains or tapes across paddocks, cut down trees on distant hills tops to produce suitable site lines or relocate directors on the position to give all users of "line and bearing" a free and uninterrupted window.

All we need today is the GPS device and it will supply the exact Latitude.



Longitude and Altitude for any position the operator cares to take it. It will use Universe Transverse Mercator (UTM) on land surfaces. Time taken for computation fixing is up to 2 minutes and update is performed in approx 2 seconds. It can be used to provide bearings based upon its own orientation to magnetic north, or can be programmed for say a number of way points or battery centres with bearing carried from a datum point outside of the gun (equipment) area.

Method of operation utilises a number of orbiting satellites (21) at a range of 20,000 kms and they travel in nearly a circular orbit with a 12 hour period.

The Panasonic KX-G5520 GPS

The satellites are equally spaced in six orbital plains so that at least four will be visible at any one point on the earth's surface, there would normally be more

available.

The satellites transmit on a frequency of 1575.42 MHz and send positional information along with a security code to the GPS receiver which can store it. Compared to the others used the receiver is capable of receiving 5 separate signals at once and compares the relative differences between them all to produce a reading with a PE (probable error) of less than 25 metres. Although the US government can code signals during "emergency" times that will cause the signal to be dithered or altered and this will cause the PE to increase out to 100 metres.

JUNGLE JITTERS By Keith Grandin 2/12 Aust Fd Regt Assn

D u r i n g the New Guinea FINSCHHAFEN campaign we really got up Tojo's nose - so much so - that he decided to send some of his brave warriors to spike out "automatic" (so he thought) 25-pounders.

When the word went around to expect Japs in our area, we hurriedly set up defensive positions. This was a bit tricky in the dark and was further complicated by not knowing where neighboring LMGs were sited or pointing.

We could only get 8-second fuses for our grenades and weren't very thrilled to have to be hold them for 4-5 seconds before throwing.

As the night settled in, jungle noises became accentuated, the sounds of movement of ground animals and birds caused our imaginations to run riot.

It was decided that it would be useful to have some infantry support and a patrol from 2/17th or 2/43rd Battalion was despatched to our area.

Near us was a 40-mm Light Ack Ack detachment and they had a listening post out from their Gun.

When the piquet saw a body of men moving towards his area, he jumped from his hole, ran back and warned the Gun crew. The leading man of the infantry patrol saw the man rise from the ground thought he was a Jap, and shot him.

The wounded man made a lot of noise, and in view of the situation, there was a distinct lack of volunteers eager to go out and get him. Finally, a medic from up the KATIKA TRACK performed the rescue. However, while moving out between the trigger-happy defenders, he survived by continually shouting:

"Don't shoot - Australian wounded!" Without drawing a breath, until he got back to a safe spot.

There was no further incident that night and we were glad to see the daylight next morning. The Japs apparently aborted their raid and returned to their waiting submarine which was later sighted in LANGEMAK BAY but that's another story.

Poetrant of Major-Geograf Sir William Throaby Bridges, 4.2.6, 0 M.C. The Street Commences of the Popul Milliary College

Major General Sir William Throsby Bridges. KCB. CMG, founder of Duntroon, Royal Military College, ACT and its first Commandant

The building to be occupied by the Artillery at Puckapunyal Military Base, will be known as the "Bridges Barracks.".

However, it is not about the renowned General that I want to write but rather his horse, named, 'Sandy the Waler'. They were called 'Walers' because they were bred in New South Wales as remounts for the Australian Armed Forces during the 1914-18 Great War.

'The Avenue of Honour that I am currently restoring at Lysterfield Vic, was planted by a person named Gus Powell, he was a breeder of horses for the British, and Australian Armies, sending some 6,000 to the Boer War. I think we are well aware of the part played by horses in both wars, especially with the Artillery.

Of the 160,000 horses shipped overseas during the 1914-18 war, Sandy was the one picked out by Major General Bridges, who was in charge of the entire Australian Army. This horse was for his own personal use, and he was often seen riding him around the camps in Egypt.

Horses were not taken to Gallipoli, but it was here that General Bridges was fatally shot.

When the war was over Sandy was the only horse privileged to return to Australia, and spent his remaining years grazing in paddocks around Duntroon, RMC.

General Bridges body was also returned to Australia and is buried just behind the College, on the side of the hill.

Phenomenon

When I was at the RMC in 1941, we were out on night manoeuvres, when we came across this field. It had an eerie glow across it, we looked at it in amazement, being a very dark hight added to the atmosphere of the locality. Our instructors then set our minds at ease, by telling us the paddock was infested with glow worms and I think they came this way to see the effect it had on us, we by-passed that particular field and went on with our exercise.

I thought no more about it until last Anzac Da.y, I went over to Victoria Barracks, there was a display of various military objects, but one young female corporal was giving a talk on the books and pamphlets she had in her possession, so I stopped and listened. When she came to the booklet about the "Walers" I asked if I could have one, which she gave to me. It is rather a sensitive book about General Bridges and his horse.

My parents had horses when I was young and over the years I had done a fair amount of riding, so it appealed to me. I was only sorry that when I was at Duntroon, that horse riding was already abandoned, although the training areas were still there.

In the closing of the booklet it states, "If you go into Duntroon preferably at midnight, and wait near the grave of Major General Sir William Throsby Bridges, you might see the General and his beloved horse Sandy galloping across the misty playing fields of Duntroon."

I saw the General's grave many times, but not at midnight. Was this field that had the eerie misty glow that we saw while on our manoeuvres, one of the paddocks his old horse used to graze in ...who knows?

No I am not seeing "fairies at the bottom of the garden" ... yet, but I do nope there is someone who reads the 'Cascabel' who can verify what I have stated about the 'Glow Worms'.


