





JOURNAL NAME:

CASCABEL - Spanish - Origin as small bell or Campanilla (pro: Kaskebell),

spherical bell, knob like projection.

CASCABLE - English spelling. REASON FOR:



Once a fixed extension left over when a muzzle loaded gun was molten cast. It was the left over molten ore plug from the cast liquid entry point. Left on as it was found to be a good handle to move or elevate the barrel. Then shaped to look like a bell.

ARTILLERY USE:

After 1800 AD, it became adjustable. The breech is closed in large calibres by a CASCABEL(E) screw, which is a solid block of forged wrought iron, screwed into the breach coil until it pressed against the end of the steel tube. In the smaller calibres, the A bore tube is carried through to form the CASCABEL(E).

The name was put forward by the first editor, LTCOL Rob Gaw, and accepted because of its unique and obvious Artillery connection.

ASSN LOGO:

Our Assn Logo is the 1800 AD 9 Pdr Waterloo Field Gun. Copy is taken from Device, Badge and Motto of the Royal Regiment of Artillery, as approved in 1883, by HM King William IV.

LAPEL BADGE:

Copy of the left arm brass gilded gun once worn by Gun Sgts above the chevrons on each arm. Brassards worn by IGs at North Head were embroided with this insignia. Selected by MAJ Warren Barnard, 1984 Assn Committee.

The President Writes

I am allowed to be the last in to submit copy for this the spring time issue of Cascabel only because I am expected to report on the Annual General Meeting held in late August. I guess that the most important purpose of Cascabel is to keep the members informed of the business of the Association but it would be great if a few more could come along to the AGM and get the good oil first hand. I must admit that it was probably the worst night for the meeting that we have had for some years, so it was pleasing to see about thirty members present.

AGM's of any well run organisation tend to be fairly bland and predetermined unless there is some unforseen factor occurring. In our case I am glad to say that was not the case and things flowed along smoothly. Most of the matters discussed will be covered in other parts of the magazine but I shall give a brief outline of events.

Our Treasurer Reg. Morrel presented a very detailed report in accordance with the modern procedures required by the Associations Incorporation Act. We have seven pages which prove that we have a net worth of \$40,344.94. Whilst that figure does not vary greatly from year to year it should be noted that about \$9000 is presently in shop stock much of which is Band CD's which we would like you all to buy up as soon as possible. Reg also presented a proposed budget showing a modest deficit. It was however resolved that there was no reason to increase the fees at this time.

David Osborne presented his Membership Report showing a strength of 390 at the end of June. I expect he will publish his report elsewhere in the magazine so that you can see the detailed make up of the membership profile. He and I exhort you to seek out friends who may be eligible to become members.

My President's Report really consists of a resume of the Associations activities over the year and most things have been previously reported on in earlier issues.

The committee as shown in the front of the magazine was elected unopposed. LTCOL John Morkham has declined to continue on the committee this year due to other commitments but is to continue as convening officer for the Gunner Dinner and to conduct the Direction 2000 project.

WO2 Trevor Hopkins has agreed to continue as auditor and we thank him for that task. He tells me that he is often assisted in this job by Judith Davis who many will remember as a staunch member of the committee several years ago and I thank her for that.

LTCOL Richard Maurice CO 2/10 Medium Regiment was to have reported to the meeting on the activities of the his Regiment but was unable to attend. He was ably represented by the Adjutant Captain Simon Grace who gave us a very detailed and professional presentation on the state of the Regiment.

The COL COMD BRIG Graeme Standish addressed the meeting on matters of higher Regimental interest.

LTCOL Maurice was to have given a presentation on his experiences in the Sinai during his previous posting but was taken away on other duties. He has been appointed Director of Practice for "Exercise CROCODILE" at Shoalwater Bay Training area later in the year and is required to go off frequently and at short notice to supervise preparations. I hope that we can hear about Sinai at the next AGM.

Major Jim Killender is assembling the history of the artillery units in Victoria during the last fifty years and you will remember he asked for information in an earlier issue. This project is continuing and

Jim will be happy to have any information we can provide. Particularly he is anxious to be able to tie together the locations of units and their manning. To help with this he would be pleased to have names of senior NCO's and above, together with unit, location, posting and dates. Information can be sent to J. There is little in the way of official records of this data and it is important to capture the truth before we all forget the detail. I recommend this project to all of you.

We are a little disappointed at the lack of submissions regarding the Direction 2000 project. This matter will continue to be open for discussion until next year so if you have any thoughts please contact John Morkham.

The Artillery Ball went off well once again. It was a very pleasant venue although a bit further away than some of us are used to. There was some confusion about the date which was wrongly published in Cascabel and I guess that did not help the attendance much. I have not been able to talk to Andrew Langford the convening officer yet to find out if that was the reason that there was no response from the School of Artillery this year. Our thanks to Andrew for his efforts in organising the Ball under difficult conditions. The Ball was significant for one event. It is not often you see a Battery Commander propose to his girl friend in front of the assembled Regiment but Major Aleks Kostadinovic and Lieutenant Samrika Payne became engaged to be married before our very eyes. Very romantic and our very best wishes to them for a happy future.



Christopher Jobson, Australian War Memorial, replies:

At the completion of battles, in days gone-by, Retreat would be sounded and units would reassemble in the form of hollow squares to call the roll and count the dead. The dead were placed within the squares and no one used these areas as thoroughfares. Today the parade grounds represent these squares and hence a unit's dead.

It is deemed to be hallowed ground, soaked with the blood of our fallen, and the areas are respected as such.

REPORTS FROM THE AGM

Thirty members attended the AGM. on Thu 26 Aug 99, at 2/10 Mdm Regt's depot at Chapel Street. We were made welcome and comfortable by the Adjutant and the RSM on a wet and miserable Melbourne winter evening.

Commanding Officer's Report

CAPT Simon Grace (Adjt) gave this report as the CO, LTCOL Richard Maurice, was interstate due to his duties as 'Ex Crocodile' Director of Practice.

Personnel Stats:

- * 2/10 Mdm Regt is at 58% of Minimum Level of Capability (MLOC), which allows manning at 28 OFFR, 55 WO/SNCO, and 272 OR. 75% of members are compliant with Army Individual Readiness Notice (AIRN) requirements, with a further 9% allowed a waiver for temporary conditions.
- * The unit has recruited 23 since June '98 (target was 97), but has lost 86 through discharges and transfers. The unit has no control over recruiting, as priorities are set by 4 Bde HQ. A recruiting campaign is planned for course over Christmas holidays.

Training Activities:

- * 'Ex Bardia' in July saw 22 Fd Bty support 5/6 RVR in a Battalion Group LFX at Cultarna. 4 Bde was exposed to a working Bde level JOSCC (previously FSCC), and made aware of Gunner role as Offensive Support Advisers.
- * CO Tac Party will be provided for 'Ex Crocodile 99' FTX East, in Sep/Oct.
- * 'Ex Bobdubi' in Nov/Dec will see 38 Mdm Bty support 8/7 RVR at Puckapunyal/Sale.
- * Freedom of the City Port Phillip is planned for 14 Nov 99.
- * 2/10 Regimental Birthday weekend is on 1-2 Apr 00.
- * Freedom of the City Geelong on 8/9 Apr 00, is yet to be confirmed.
- * Other activities include Adventure Training, Soldiers' Dinner and Farewells (16 Oct 99), Employer Nights, Regimental Open Day (18-19 Mar 00) and Olympic Games Support.

General RAA Issues:

- * 8/12 Mdm Regt to raise additional Bty with move to Darwin (1 Bde).
- * 38 Bty M198s will go to 1 Fd Regt, which becomes 1 Mdm Regt.
- * Greater demands on Reserve Units OP Belisi (Bouganville) etc.
- * Call On Bill due in Parliament shortly, to safeguard Reserve members' jobs during short periods of full time duty.

Colonel Commandant's Report

BRIG G. .Standish covered the following items:

- * With disestablishment of the Directorate of Artillery, the Honorary Head of Corps has other full time duties, so Representative Colonel Commandant has additional tasks.
- * The Artillery Museum at North Head still has considerable facilities, and worth a visit.
- * His pleasure at seeing no recent reference to lanyard change, or the Infantry Battle Groups not needing Artillery.
- * The retention of the band, pro tem, is great for the Regiment.

My first face to face contact with Bill was in 1940 in Palestine. He was playing football for his troop - I was the umpire. He avoided a tackle by chopping at the tacklers arm resulting in a free kick against this ginger headed bombardier. Then followed a conversation that was an inauspicious start to a friendship that lasted until interrupted last Saturday.

Bill was a happy character - always a smile, and his cry of, "God Bless the King, the Russians and Billy Swalwell" (at odd times the Pope or Uncle Joe Stalin would get a mention), could be heard at very odd times.

His was an early enlistment, his Regimental was No VX1002. He was inclined to be rude when his mates with three digit numbers asked him what took him so long.

It became evident that there was a considerable number of ex Footscray Tech. boys in the Regiment. This was not so surprising as our 2/IC William Edward Cremor was a teacher from that school. It was often said that if you were not a Footscray Tech. boy you had little hope of promotion. I am forced to admit that they produced a bunch of great soldiers. BRIG Richard Eason, LTCOL Bill Swalwell, MAJ Ron McPherson, CAPT Fred Young, CAPT Wally Ring.

Bill originally came on strength as a trumpeter. A good God spared us and he moved on to other things. We really became close mates after his promotion to Sergeant. If there were any high jinks we would be in it. Terry and Jeanine were loathe to credit that on one occasion we danced ballet at a mess party. A very unlikely duo of Sugar Plum fairies. I think he invented the shirt front on that night.

This is not meant to be a resume of the war but one of Bill's favourite memories was one of Crete. We were walking through a field avoiding the road because of enemy air activity. Suddenly an ME109 appeared, no doubt looking for targets on the road. Instead he spotted us, turned and came back. We scrambled over a stone wall to take cover. A burst of fire and he was gone, we thought. But no, the pilot had a sense of humour. He came back five or six times - no doubt amused by our clumsy wall hopping.

After Crete Bill was commissioned in the field, as were Keith Houghton, Mick Richardson and me. This did not change him a bit. If he could stir up a scragging he would. We were a handy pair of front row rugby forwards, indoor rugby. The God Bless the King etc. cry was often heard.

Lt Swalwell continued to serve the Regiment well in various postings. On return to Australia Bill

met Iris and married. He served with 2/2 Field Regiment until the end of the war after which he soldiered on in the CMF(now Army Reserve) The 2/2 Field Regiment had a great influence on the post war field regiments. Bill played his part in that. He became 2/IC of 2 Field Regiment and later became Commanding Officer of 15 Field Regiment.

Having met many of the officers who served with him in the CMF, and having listened to speeches made at the Gunner Dinners, which we old buffers are delighted to attend, it was obvious that Bill held the affection and respect of his officers. He was a good CO. This had it's effect on me - I did not remind him nearly as often of the time in Ceylon, when on the few occasions that the Survey Party caught up, the accurate co-ordinates had my pivot gun 200 yards out to sea.

His civilian occupation was concerned with the building industry. He retired from James Hardie in 1982 after suffering a stroke. In retirement he took an active part in Neighbourhood Watch and Probus.

One morning very early he phoned me to tell me that Iris had died overnight. Although he showed his usual courage it took a great toll on him. I spoke to him by phone on Thursday last and promised to visit him this week - he will know that I have done so.

RSL Honour for Veteran

WANTIRNA South resident Edmund Williams has received the rare honour of a second RSL award recognising his efforts to revitalise the Lysterfield War Memorial and the Avenue of Honour.

Mr Williams was presented with his second national certificate of appreciation last month after he successfully lobbied to move power lines that threatened the Avenue's English and Silky Oaks (Knox News January 19, 1999).


"I thought it would take 12 months, but it took more than three years," the 82-year-old ex-serviceman said.

Letters to the Editor

Just a short response to your Cascabel #60 cover photograph. I think the photograph is of an Australian manufactured searchlight body, with the parabolic mirror still in place, but no glass front or other fittings. The "peculiar aspect" to which you refer is, I assume, that the image in the mirror is upside down compared to the background. Now, I'm no physicist, but I think the simple explanation is that the photographer is standing within or closer than the focal length of the mirror, hence, any object reflected from the parabola appears upside down. As the outer edges of the main body and the mirror appear eccentric, the photographer must be standing slightly to one side (otherwise they would appear concentric). This also results in the photographer not being included in the image, which appears to be a person seated some distance away. My guess is that our President took the photograph while visiting the East Point Military Museum, where, according to my notes taken during a visit in December 1995, just such a searchlight resides!

Association members who also regularly read the Australian Army's ARMY magazine may have noted the articles on the 105 mm M2A2, Yeramba Self-propelled 25 pdr, and 105 mm L5 Pack Howitzer which have appeared over recent years. While the original specification provided by the Editor was for profiles of small arms, I've nevertheless managed to slip the occasional artillery piece in, as well! Hope the readers from the Association have enjoyed them.

Finally I would like to suggest the object on the front cover of the June Cascabel is looking into the front of an AA searchlight mirror. 
