





JOURNAL NAME:

CASCABEL - Spanish - Origin as small bell or Campanilla (pro: Kaskebell), spherical bell, knob like projection.



CASCABLE - English spelling. **REASON FOR:**

Once a fixed extension left over when a muzzle loaded gun was molten cast. It was the left over molten ore plug from the cast liquid entry point. Left on as it was found to be a good handle to move or elevate the barrel. Then shaped to look like a bell.

ARTILLERY USE:

After 1800 AD, it became adjustable. The breech is closed in large calibres by a CASCABEL(E) screw, which is a solid block of forged wrought iron, screwed into the breach coil until it pressed against the end of the steel tube. In the smaller calibres, the A bore tube is carried through to form the CASCABEL(E).

CASCABEL HISTORY:

The name was put forward by the first editor, LTCOL Rob Gaw, and accepted because of its unique and obvious Artillery connection.

ASSN LOGO:

Our Assn Logo is the 1800 AD 9 Pdr Waterloo Field Gun. Copy is taken from Device, Badge and Motto of the Royal Regiment of Artillery, as approved in 1883, by HM King William IV.

LAPEL BADGE:

Copy of the left arm brass gilded gun once worn by Gun Sgts above the chevrons on each arm. Brassards worn by IGs at North Head were embroided with this insignia. Selected by MAJ Warren Barnard, 1984 Assn Committee.

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
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EDITOR'S EXOTERICS



"THE HISTORY OF LOCATING ARTILLERY IN AUSTRALIA"

WO2 Craig Cook, 132 Div Loc Bty would be pleased to hear from anyone who served in pre-war or AIF Arty units designated as Artillery Survey Coy, Svy Regt, Sound Ranging Bty or Flash Spotting Bty.

He is trying to trace the historical development of Locating from the early days of 1926 [2 Svy Coy AGA], any and every possible bit of info is very helpful.

He would be prepared to correspond with or talk to any one who would care to contact him in this project.

Although he knows of the names of certain units there is very little or no documented evidence that some units were raised from Bty to Regt level.

Any gunner who can help whether he served in the locating stream or gunnery should contact him as even small pieces of info can help fill the bigger picture.

If anyone has photos or other documents he would be very pleased to look at them also.

As an example he has some personal records and student note books dating back to 1937/8 of the late Sgt Keith Miles [ex 2 Svy Coy] which have proved most interesting and invaluable in looking at the unit's early days.

He also has a number of copies of Unit Routine Instructions and Camp Joining Instructions from 1938-43 which have survived and are really interesting to go through now.

All this information is needed to complete the research of the early days of the original two Survey Coys/Btys/Regts in Victoria and NSW for the publication of "The History of Locating Artillery in Australia"



THE REGIMENT IN THE FIELD FIRING DAY

PUCKAPUNYAL 11 SEP 99


On Saturday, 11 Sep 99, 12 of our members visited the field firing exercise of 38 Mdm Bty, 2/10 Mdm Regt RAA, at their firing weekend at Puckapunyal, as was organised by Merv Taggart and Robin Smith.

On a perfect spring day, we all arrived at "Range Control", where we met with six members of the 10 Mdm Regt RAA Assn,, eight ex-gunners of the National Servicemen's Assn. and with great pleasure three members of the 2/4 Fd Regt RAA Assn. (2nd AIF), Messrs P Cahir, D McIver and R Harle. I'm sure they lost 40 years the moment they stepped onto the range.

The 2/10 Mdm Regt 2IC, MAJ McCallum and RSM WO1 Jones met us, advised us of Range Safety, organised us into groups and then moved us by bus to the OP on Tehans Hill. Here we were briefed by the BC, MAJ Kostindinovic and three young so who indicated the intended target. Here the BK, CAPT Stevens outlined the deployment of his battery, also advised us due to ammunition restrictions, the battery was using I05 mm M2A2 guns and not their I55 mm MI98 howitzers. We were then taken to the kitchen area and served tea/coffee and scones.



The GPO, LT Sullivan gave us a brief description of his Comd Post and the latest equipment in use for Communication and Target Acquisition, then in three groups we moved down to where the three guns were deployed. Here our individual groups were shown ammunition preparation and firing drills. We observed close-up of a "Fire Mission" from the gun pits and it was good to inhale in the fumes of burnt cordite again.

After the Mission, we were taken back to "Range Control" and debriefed by the 2IC Then back to our vehicles after saying our

"Good-byes" and thanks to the 2IC and RSM, also to Merv, our President, who organised an enjoyable and exhilarating day.

In a Nutshell

CENTENARY PASSES FOR AUSTRALIAN **ARTILLERY**

The Mayor of the City of Port Phillip the Commanding Officer of the 2nd/10th Medium Regiment at 11 am, Sunday 14 November 1999, at Dorothy Paul Field, Albert Park Reserve.

The troops then marched to Fitzroy Street along Lakeside Drive.

At 12 noon, almost 40 artillery vehicles with 120 soldiers aboard departed from the corner of Fitzroy Street & Lakeside Drive and paraded down Fitzroy Street and the Upper Esplanade to vehicles.

The Granting of Freedom of Entry

The granting of Freedom of Entry to a City is a centuries long tradition.

The 2nd/10th Medium Regiment is based at Chapel Street St Kilda and is an important part of the City of Port Phillip's community.

The Port Phillip Council was proud to formally welcome the troops into their City by granting and celebrating their Freedom of Entry.

The Challenge

When the Regiment paraded down Fitzroy Street, the Chief Constable and two mounted police I challenged the Regiment at the corner into the Upper Esplanade, asking "who goes there!".

The Commanding Officer produced the Scroll showing that the troops have Freedom of Entry to the City of Port Phillip.

approaching millennium The presented the Scroll granting Freedom of Entry to centenary of Federation are such significant events in our history that some of the lesserknown milestones are in danger of passing unobserved.

> August 24 holds special significance for Australian Artillery as the centenary of a granting of the royal title by the reigning monarch of the day, Queen Victoria.

RAA COL Commandant Eastern Region, BRIG George Salmon said that on July 14, 1899, the Queen decreed that the Permanent Artillery of Cavell Street, where the troops stationed their New South Wales, Victoria and Queensland should be designated the New South Wales, Victoria and Queensland Regiments of the Royal Australian Artillery.

> "When the decree came into effect on August 24, it was the first semblance of a federal force, more than 16 months ahead of the federation of the Australian States on January 1, 1901." he said.

> On December 30, 1899, the newly titled RAA (specifically A Bty) went to war in South Africa, remaining in that Country for 18 months.

> State Regiments subsequently transferred to the Commonwealth on March 1, 1901.

> Chris Jobson, from the Australian War Memorial, said the date should not be confused with the raising of A Bty on August 1, 1871.

> The Regiment was presented with the Queen's Banner on the centenary of this date in 1971, celebrated as the official birthday of the Regiment.

A Touch of History

The Gun in the Launceston City Park

As far back as I can remember, the old black 'cannon' has overlooked the slopes in Launceston's City Park. When I was a kid I used to sit astride it and pretend I was a gunner preparing to blow the bejabbers out of any invading enemy coming up the river-flats near the old defunct Railway yards. Generations of kids, including mine and my grandchildren, have rolled down the neat grassy slopes below its foreboding barrel without a thought of its history - they only know that it has been a part of their playground for nearly 150 years. However, as part of the Artillery Trust responsibilities, a little history lesson may enlighten some of us on why an old Russian naval gun came to be mounted in the Launceston City Park.

In 1990, to celebrate the 130th Anniversary of the Launceston Volunteer Artillery, the Artillery Historical Trust of Tasmania, Northern Branch presented the City of Launceston with a bronze plaque that contained the following inscription.

THIS 38 POUNDER GUN WAS CAPTURED FROM THE RUSSIANS AT SEBASTOPOL DURING THE CRIMEAN WAR 1854-56 AND WAS PRESENTED TO THE TOWN OF LAUNCESTON BY THE HOME GOVERNMENT AS A RESULT OF THE CHARITABLE EFFORTS OF THE PEOPLE OF LAUNCESTON IN RAISING FUNDS FOR THE PATRIOTIC FUND. THE GUN WAS CAST IN THE EMPEROR ALEXANDER FACTORY IN THE YEAR 1840. BORE 7 INCHES.

DOCUMENTED BY THE ARTILLERY HISTORICAL TRUST OF TASMANIA NORTHERN BRANCH TO COMMEMORATE THE 130th ANNIVERSARY OF THE LAUNCESTON VOLUNTEER ARTILLERY 1860-1990.

Hidden away on the right cascabel is the inscription in Russian, that reads:-

36 - H(?) Cannon - Carronade Weight 142 - Pounds. 1840 - Year.

On the left cascabel, the roughly translated inscription reads:-

No. 26851 Alksnd (Alexander) Factory Origin: Armstrong


The double-headed Imperial Russian Eagle crest is positioned prominently half way down the barrel -with the large letters M and A on each side of the breech vent. It is to be noted that to make using these heavy naval guns far easier, the Russians remounted a few on cast-iron gun carriages.

The Siege of Sebastopol 1854-55.

The Crimean war started in 1853 and initially involved Russia versus Turkey. By 1854, Britain

and France had also become involved and declared war on Russia. Sardinia joined the Allies in 1855.

Sebastopol was originally developed to be the most important and its Russian naval base, main arsenal, on the Black Sea. The brickand-masonry fortifications had been commenced in 1783 and upgraded periodically to make it considered impregnable by the standards of the day. In 1807 the Czar ordered further works but nothing was done until the war broke out in 1853. By April 1854, Colonel Frants Todleben had been to appointed upgrade the fortifications but, because hе considered that any invasion would come from the sea. he took his time with the inland facing defences.



The French and British landed on September 13th 1854 at Old Fort - 30 miles to the north of Sebastopol - and after defeating Prince Menshikov's army at Alma, the Allies were within sight of the northern defences of the port. They considered the northern approaches too strong and so they decided to march to the south - however, they underestimated the strength of the partly constructed defences and decided that an estimated 500 casualties was too high a price to pay to breach them.

Todelben was let off the hook and immediately set about strengthening the fortification by using every able-bodied man he could muster. In the meanwhile the Allies began a formal siege.

By mid-October, Sebastopol was one of the most formidable fortresses in the world. Due to lack of bricks-and-masonry materials, Todelben had his men raise massive earthwork bastions connected with trenches and supporting batteries. He had so many guns, over 3000 - most of these from the Russian Black Sea Fleet -that many had to be stored.

The bombardment started on 17th October 1854 and was destined to continue until September 8th 1855. After terrible carnage (over 300.000 men) the Russian commander, Prince Gorchakov, - who was losing up to 1000 men a day - blew up the town and retreated across a pontoon bridge to the stronger northern defences. It was estimated that the allies had fired 1,2500,000 projectiles into Sebastopol before the withdrawal.

REPORT ON ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE DEFENCE RESERVES ASSOCIATION - VICTORIAN BRANCH ON SUNDAY 31 OCTOBER 1999 AT RAA DEPOT - CHAPEL STREET - WINDSOR

The President attended the AGM of the Defence Reserves Association - Victorian Branch at the Chapel Street Depot on Sunday 31 October 1999. Our Association is affiliated with the DRA as are several other Corps and Regimental Associations which were also represented at the meeting. The DRA is involved in the support of the Australian Defence Forces and in particular the Reserve component.

The President of the DRA Brigadier A J McGalliard RFD ED (Ret'd) welcomed members and representatives to the meeting and outlined matters which had received the committee's special attention in recent times including:

- Need for and employment of Reserve units in East Timor.
- Protective legislation for called out Reservists.
- The 6 week recruit and IET training courses for Reservists and the effect upon recruiting and civilian employment.
- Correspondence with the Prime Minister regarding concerns for the future of the Reserves.
- Ongoing meetings between the National Executive and senior Government representatives.
- Affiliations with Regimental, Corps and Service Associations.
- Contacts with DRSC, RSL, NSA, ADA, RUSI and the Society of ME.
- Reserve Forces Day.

Following the election of the President and committee for 1999, the President welcomed the Assistance Chief of the Defence Force (Reserves) Major General D C Low Choy AM MBE RFD who addressed the meeting. In doing so, Major General Low Choy advised the meeting of a recent change in the organisational position of his office which now gives him much needed input into the effect of strategic planning reflecting the growing awareness of the importance of the Reserves to the overall capability of the Australian Defence Force. This seachange in perception is opening a window of opportunity for the Reserve to improve its representation to truly reflect the civilian population from which it is drawn, and for the enhancement of the awareness of the Reserves right throughout all strata of the Australian community.

It is only by casting the Reserves in a consistent favourable light that the valuable resource it represents can be fully appreciated by the Australian people and the Government can be encouraged to provide the resources and apport desperately needed to properly exploit the Reserves' latent potential. The bridge which the Reserves are capable of providing between the military and the community is a further unique benefit available from a properly resourced and supported citizen military force.

Squadron Leader J Leonard, CO of 21 Squadron RAAF also addressed the meeting and in doing so revealed the results of some comparative research he has carried out which shows a very welcome change in the differences between the Australian Defence Academy organisation and individual student's perceptions of the relative importance of officer qualities. The conclusion being drawn is that the quality of leaders now being graduated at the ADA has improved at a remarkable rate over the past several years.





During a recent visit to Canberra, I was fortunate in being present to see a re-enactment parade of the "Imperial Bushmen's Contingent" of Light Horse, in period uniform, to commemorate the centenary of the start of the Boer War.


The parade consisted of a Head Quarters in twos,






led by LTCOL Mike Annett and the Colour Party, with flags from Australia, New Zealand, Great Britain, Canada, South Africa and the Regimental Colours, escorted by a troop of Lancers. Then followed two squadrons in fours, a field ambulance and supply wagon both horse drawn.

The contingent marched down ANZAC Parade, then wheeled about and proceeded back up to the forecourt of the National War Memorial. In all, there were 150 horses from detachments and all organisations over Australia, the greatest assembly of horse since World War Two.





At the War Memorial, the parade was met by the Governor-General, William Deane, a Service Guard" supplied Army Head Quarters Canberra, the band from Royal the Military College, Duntroon, and a period quard from "Militarv Enactment Association".

The Governor-General was presented with a parchment by LTCOL Annett, to commemorate the occasion and then unveiled a plaque in memory of all service personal who served in the South African War. The master of ceremony was Mr Colin Munro and the parade coordinator and drill instructor was WOl Greg Hooper CSM, the RSM of the School of Armour, Puckapunyal.

This parade concluded a three day exercise from Sunday 10th October, to Tuesday 12th October 1999, which included "Tent Pegging and Drills" on the Sunday, a parade along Commonwealth Avenue to Parliament House on the Monday, and presenting the Prime Minister, Mr Howard, with a scroll listing the deeds of the Australian Light Horse throughout the war.

To say it was a moving event would be an understatement and the only thing missing was a horse drawn "qun and limber". As I had cause to contact WOl Hooper in regards to the parade and to congratulate him on such a great effort, I dropped him the hint. He advised that they almost had a gun of



the period, (a 15 pounder I presume, the type which was used by A Battery during this war), from the Northern Territory, but it needed far too much work to make it serviceable for the parade.

I advised him of a similar type of gun, a 12 pounder Armstrong breach loading rifled gun, (one of the Rupertswood Guns), which has been fully restored. This gun is held by the Deniliquin RSL, on display in a glass cabinet, in their foyer. As plans have started for the 2001 anniversary celebrations, WO1 Hooper advised that he will be contacting them for the possible use with the "Light Horse" in the year 2001 parade.

THE RUPERTSWOOD GUN

(On display at the Deniliquin RSL Club)

This Gun is one of two used by the Victorian Horse Artillery, better known as the Rupertswood Battery, a unique Australian fighting force which existed in Victoria from 1885-97.

The Battery was formed by Sir William Clarke to protect the young colony from foreign invasion, particularly from Russia, and was funded partly by him and partly by The Victorian Government.

This gun, one of a pair, replaced the Battery's original guns in 1889, but was already 30 years old and considered a stopgap only.

The Government's continual refusal to honour its commitment to provide new guns eventually led to the disbanding of the Battery soon after the death of its patron.

Its final duty was performed at a parade in Melbourne to mark Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee.

rifled bore.

SERIAL NUMBER: 368 (ordinance) and 408 (carriage).

CALIBRE: 3 Inch.

MARKINGS: Crest of Queen Victoria forward of breech.

RIFLING: 38 Lands.

WEIGHT: 8 cwt 2 gtrs (ordinance) and 12 cwt (carriage).

This type of gun was;

- the first wrought iron gun used in British service,
- the first breech loading artillery used in British service,
- and the first rifled gun used in British service.

This gun was made available by the Landale family of "Dahwilly" Deniliquin. Faithfully restored by the Staff & Apprentices of the Army Apprentices School, Latchford Barracks, BONEGILLA: 1989.

ANOTHER HISTORIC BUILDING THAT LOOKS LIKE GOING THE WAY OF MANY OTHERS

In the Ballarat Courier dated 30 Oct the council is seeking expression of interest in the disposal of the famous RANGER BARRACKS drill hall in Curtis St.

It appears the land and adjacent area has been acquired by a developer to build a new complex on, and in their desire "to get the tender" it appears they will move the drill hall to another site. To anyone who knows of this depot then the job of disassembly, removal and rebuilding would be quite a feat.

Considering that Ballarat has had a military commitment dating back to 21 July 1858 when consent was given to raise a volunteer force of rifles it would seem a pity to see the old drill hall [although not the original] disappear without some sort of activity.

The notice in the paper says "it will be available when the present users have relocated". With the current movements in Defence is there any one who knows what is happening to the Reserves in Ballarat?

Perhaps they are moving out of town [prime real estate] to the smaller drill hall behind Ballarat college which may again revert to the education department if recruiting lags in the area.

A shade of days with our own Artillery unit moving from Frankston to Baxter and then to relinquish it to the education authorities. If anyone would like to know more about this fine old drill hall and what the council has in store for it then perhaps a line to Garry Purton at Business Ballarat on 03 5320-5620 or by Email at purton@ballarat.vic.gov.au may be of interest.

This is a copy of a request for information which I sent to Garry Purdon.

"It has just come to my attention in the Public notices in Courier dated 30 Oct 99 re the above building. From the announcement it appears that a feasibility study has been done to look at the actual aspect of moving the hall to an alternative site. Is this the case, and just how much demolition would be needed to do this and how much of the original building would be able to be restored."

"When are the existing users due to move and how long before the structure would need to be removed after that time.?"

"Is there also any National trust preservation order or perhaps a Ballarat council requirement on the relocation distance that may be involved.?"

"While relocation has been offered by the developers I

assume the council is seeking a monetary tender for the purchase of this building."

Here is the reply I received. Looks like the existing unit is moving and soon.

Subject: RE: Curtis St, Drill Hall Date: Monday, 8 November 1999 09:25

In terms of the questions raised:

- -no, a feasibility has not been done
- part of the arrangement with the developer of the site is that he will move the building
 - he may choose to do a feasibility study.
- -no demolition expected and the building is to be restored on a new site
- -existing users are to relocated by about Feb 2000 and building moved by about March 2000
- -there is heritage interest in the building but not a formal preservation order.

Council would expect that the new site and use of the building contain a high level of Ballarat community content. This means that the building would not be available for moving to another town/suburb etc.

-monetary tender not expected.


